This is the word cabled to the editor from Paulpietersburg, South Africa, on the 7th inst.

It means that Dr. Sanders had succeeded in purchasing the Balmoral (Missionary) Farm from the Boer owner, and it is now the property of the Alliance of the Reformed Baptist Church of Canada. Thus the work of faith, which was begun several years ago, is crowned with success, and this Missionary Station has become permanently established as a free-will gift from the holiness people. And the missionary work at Balmoral Mission Station, and the outposts, has been specially successful since the money has been paid in for its purchase and greater interest has developed in supporting native workers.

There are several advantages gained by owning the Missionary Farm, which consists of 1068 acres. (1) It gives the assurance of stability to the people, who are interested in this mission. (2) It saves an annual rental of \$250. (3) The income from the farm will pay for improvements and repairs. (4) Whatever improvements are made will add value to our own property and by purchasing we have secured all the improvements we have already made in buildings, orchards and groves, etc.

We highly appreciate Dr. and Sister Sanders and their excellent family in the work and success in establishing Balmoral Mission Station, and also the grand success they are having in the conversions they are so frequently having; but like the work of all of our brethren and sisters, it will never be fully known and appreciated until the great gathering day.

we now hope we will be able to give more attention and assistance in the home missionary work. There are many places near us where the holiness work has not as yet reached. We do not know just how we can accomplish the greatest good, but we believe the Holy Spirit will direct us as soon as we are prepared to enter new fields.
