MEMORIAL SERVICE.

A service was held in the Reformed Baptist Church, Hartland, N. B., Sunday, May 20th., at 3 o'clock p. m., in memory of Lee Crandlemire, who died from wounds received in the battle of Vimy Ridge, France, April 9, 1917.

Lee was born at Brookville, Car. Co., some twenty years ago. He was converted in the early spring of 1910 and united with the Reformed Baptist Church. He enlisted in the 140th Battalion in November, 1915. He went overseas with his unit in September, 1916, and in October went over to France a draft to fill the 25th Battalion. He receive a gunshot wound in the eyes, at Vimy Ridge, April 9, and died the next day. Lee was a good boy and a friend to everybody. His letters were always full of encouragement and cheer.

The service was largely attended and was under the direction of Rev. P. J. Trafton, assisted by Rev. H. S. Dow. · Text: 2 Sam, 1-26. He leaves to mourn their loss, his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. John Crandlemire, and three sisters, Mrs. Fred Thornton, Eva and Hazel, all residing in Hartland. A little mound of earth somewhere in France, with a little cross at the head, marks the last resting place of an only son and brother, and brave soldier.
