## THE TWENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL CAMP MEETING AT BEULAH CAMP GROUND.



THE LATE EDGAR MARSHALL TINGLEY.
Edgar M Tingley.

The Moncton Church has suffered another loss in the death of Brother Tingley, who was a man who truly loved the church, and never considered any work or sacrifice was too much to devote to the church. To fully appreciate what he was to the Moncton church one must be a regular attendant. Brother Tingley was a man whose "goings were established;" he could certainly be found at one of three places, at his work, his home or the church. He gave these three places his undivided time and attention. We could scarcely say too much of Brother Tingley's life and service in the places named. He was in the true sense "a servant of all" in the church and Sunday school, and is greatly missed by the people and the children and was greatly devoted to his class of boys. He had a deep interest in all the services and always took part. He prefaced almost every testimony he gave by the words, "I am glad I'm alive." MONCTON LOSES HIGHLY
RESPECTED CITIZEN.

Mr. Edgar M. Tingley, C. G. R. Foreman, Passes Away at His Home.

Moncton has lost one of its most respected citiens in the person of Mr. Edgar Marshall Tingley, who passed away at his home on Park street shortly before eight o'clock this morning (June 8th.)

Mr. Tingley had been in failing health for the past few months. Many in Moncton and throughout the province will be shocked to learn of his death.

The late Mr. Tingley was born at Harvey, Albert Co., on August 18th, 1859. He went to the United States when quite a young man and later returned to St. John.

On March 12th, 1882, he married Huldah Kinnie, of Harvey, Albert County. His parents were Samuel and Nancy Tingley, of Harvey, Albert County.

Mr. Tingley was converted at the Baptist Church, Harvey, in the year 1878. When he arrived in Moncton, twenty years ago, he became a member of the Reformed Baptist Church of this city.

Mr. Tingley was an employee of the C. G. R. shops where he was held in high esteem by all the men. He has held this position for the last few years. He leaves to mourn besides his wife, one son, Gordon M., and five brothers. The brothers are Daniel R., of Rhode Island; J. Calvin, of Arlington Heights, Mass.; Otis K., and Asa A., of Midway, Albert Co., and Miles E., of Riverside, Albert County.

Since coming to Moncton, Mr. Tingley has been a member of the Reformed Baptist Church, and has taken an active part in all departments of the church work.

Mr. R. B. Kinnie, instructor of Manual Training of this city, is a nephew.

## THE FUNERAL OF EDGAR M. TINGLEY.

There was a large attendance at the funeral of Edgar M. Tingley on Sunday afternoon from his late residence, 35 Park street, Rev. S. A. Baker, pastor of the Reformed Baptist Church, conducted the service at the house and the grave. The hymns sung were: "He'll Wipe Away All Tears" and "We shall Walk the Realms of Glory." The floral tributes were beautiful, testifying to the high esteem in which the deceased was held. An extra barouche was required for the floral tributes. Interment took place at Elmwood Cemetery.

The pallbearers were Messrs. F. W. S. Colpitts, L. Donald, I. A. Steeves, Alex. Barnett, A. G. Good and D. H. Berry.

The late Mr. Tingley was a prominent and active member of the Reformed Baptist Church. On Sunday evening an impressive memorial service was conducted in that church by the pastor, Rev. S. A. Baker.
