She was a regular attendant with her husband at Riverside Camp Meeting. While she had difficulty in hearing, she always enjoyed attending the services, and will be very much missed by a large circle of acquaintances. funeral service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Sanderson, who spoke from Pro. 10-7, "The memory of the just is blessed."

IN MEMORIAM.

Mrs. Harleigh Watson, of Woodstock, N. B., received on Sunday morning, May 20th, a telegram from Ottawa, saying that her husband had been killed on April 9th at the battle of Vimy Ridge, France. She had received a little leather pocket book containing photographs of herself and children which he had taken with him from home, about a week before, and as the address was not in his handwriting also she feared the worst; but the telegram settled her doubts. Harleigh had enlisted here in Woodstock about two years ago in the 55th Battalion and was transferred, while in France, to the 29th Vancouver battalion in the machine gun section, and afterwards to the 14th Canadian Machine Gun Section. He had been in several severe engagements and came out safe, having one or two narrow escapes. A memorial service was held in the Reformed Baptist Church last Sunday, 27th inst, at 3 p. m. and was largely attended. The pastor, W. B. Wiggins, officiated and read the 90th Psalm, and Rev. B. Colpitts offered prayer. Mr. Wiggins then gave an address founded on the 12th verse of the 90th Psalm and after urging all to be "wise" in asking God to be prepared for the end of life and the judgment. He referred to Mr. Watson's early life when he had accepted Christ and that he was a kind father and loving husband and was now in the hands of a Merciful Father. He also referred to his being in the employ of the Woodworking Company here, one of the company and a number of his fellow-workmen being present, as also several of the members of the "Prentice Boys" of which Harleigh was a member. The singing of the choir was excellent and the hymns appropriate as "Before Jehovah's Awful Throne, ye Nations bow with Sacred Joy," "Abide with Me," and "There'll be no Shadows on the Other Side." The last anthem, "Have Faith in God," was deeply touching, as was also the "Last Post," sounded in the vestibule of the Church by the bugler of the 65th Battery, a contingent of which was drawn up on the street beside the church.

Mr. Watson leaves a wife and three children, two young boys and a little girl. He also leaves a widowed mother, who was not long ago suddenly bereft of her husband, also two brothers, Frank and Errol, and a sister, Bessie, all of St. John, and another sister, Hazel, who lives in Woodstock and makes her home with Mrs. Watson. Mr. Watson was in his 31st year of age, and was the eldest son of the late Partlow Watson, of St. John. Much sympathy is felt for the widow and children as also the widowed mother and brothers and sisters.
