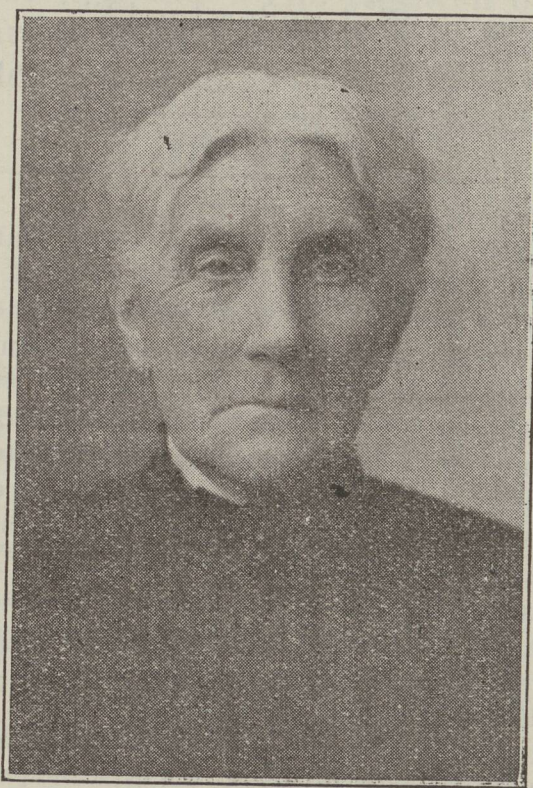
"OUR HEART IS ENLARGEMENT."

Many do Call Her Blessed.

Hundreds of our readers will be glad to look into the face of our dear Sister Bullock, who will soon reach her 79th year. Sister Bullock has been actively connected with the Holiness movement in New Brunswick ever since the winter of 1884-85. When she and her late husband took a stand with the holiness cause, from which nothing was able to move them, words could not express our feelings of appreciation of their faithfulness to us as a people when others forsook us, and when we were assailed on every hand, they never wavered, and when we undertook anything for the advancement of the cause of holiness, they always encouraged us, and helped us liberally with their means. This was especially true with our Missionary work and camp meetings. They never missed a camp meeting for twenty years at Beulah Camp Ground, and for about fifteen years at Riverside, and no worker exceeded Sister Bullock from the early morning service, and she was the last worker at the altar service at the close of the evening service, besides doing personal work at every possible opportunity, and many people sought her help in their Christian lives at all times. Surely Sister Bullock will have many stars in her crown, and our late Brother Bullock was ever at her side, and was one with her in all her work. We are delighted to state that there is a good prospect of Sister Bullock being with us at Beulah Camp Meeting and possibly Riverside again this coming summer. She is looking forward to accompanying Brother J. F. Bullock and wife to their

cottage at Beulah again, which will give her the opportunity when she is able, to attend the meetings. We asked Sister Bullock for a sketch of her history and experience, which she has kindly granted in the following:

My parents were English. My father was a very godly man, prayed morning, noon and night daily. My mother died a Christian. I always had the fear of God in my heart and at the age of 23 while on board a steamer from Portland, Me., to St. John during a severe storm, I became convicted and gave myself to God. I at once began reading my Bible constantly, united with the Methodist Church and continued faithful in private and public worship. Through faith and obedience to the Truth, as in John 17, I took Him as my Sanctifier, though I had never heard a sermon preached definitely on Holiness as a second blessing. God led me into that definite experience.

When the first Holiness Convention was held in St. John, in Berryman's Hall, during 1884-85 I was in the harness, ready for the fray, and from the first shouted victory and pushed the battle. I have never let up since, have walked in the Light, "Have fellowship one with another and the Blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanse me from all sin." God has enabled me to lead my family and hundreds into His kingdom. My day is about over, but, oh, brothers and sisters, be faithful, push the battle, for your day will soon be over too.
