EDITORIAL.

THE ALLIANCE—1888-1918.

We can scarcely bring ourselves to realize that thirty years have gone their rounds since a few of the people now living, with those who have since been called home, gathered in response to the following letter, and after prayerful consideration, decided "to organize the Alliance of the Reformed Baptist Church of Canada."

The Letter.

Woodstock, N. B.,  
October 22nd, 1888.

My Dear Brother:

Since the recent action of the F. C. Baptist Conference in reference to the ministers, etc., who teach and believe in holiness, the question naturally arises, what will or ought the believers in holiness in the various F. C. Baptist Churches and communities do? Now in order to solve this question, the friends of holiness in Woodstock have taken it upon themselves to call a convention of the friends and lovers of holiness to convene in the Main Street Baptist Church (now the Reformed Baptist Church) Woodstock, Thursday afternoon at 2.30, Nov. 1st, 1888. Will you please come as a delegate, or see that some one deeply interested in the matter will come? Or, if no one can come, be sure and write us your opinion, as it is a very important matter.

We fully measured the great responsibility, and anticipated the labour and sacrifices involved, and the great opposition we would meet, with all its misunderstandings and misrepresentation, and we fully realized what it meant to be cast out homeless as far as church home was concerned, and that we were comparatively poor in earthly goods, and but few people in number, but we felt assured that we had an Almighty Heavenly Father, with whom nothing was impossible, and our Lord

Jesus had said, "All things are possible to him that believeth."

And on Nov. 3rd, 1888, the Reformed Baptist Alliance was duly organized, followed that evening by the organization of the first Reformed Baptist Church with 41 members and 15 more were added the next day, making 56 members, and the next evening, Sunday, Nov. 4th, 1888, Revs. W. B. Wiggins, B. A., Aaron Hartt and S. A. Baker were ordained to the gospel ministry, having been refused by the late F. C. Baptist denomination because they preached entire sanctification as a definite second work of grace.

Out of twelve ordained ministers who started with the organization of the Alliance, only five are now members of the Alliance, viz., B. Colpitts, J. H. Coy, G. B. Trafton, W. B. Wiggins, B. A., and S. A. Baker. Three others, Revs. A. Kinney, A. Hartt and H. H. Cosman have united with other denominations, and the other four have gone to their reward. But this, the 30th annual meeting, finds us with a good list of brethren whom God has raised up and put into his vineyard to carry on this grand work of scriptural holiness. The work has grown under the blessing of our great heavenly Father, and guidance of the Holy Spirit, who has enabled us to hold up the standard without compromise through the years of our struggles.

BEULAH AND RIVERSIDE CAMP  
MEETINGS.

During the thirty years these two grand rallying places, with their annual meetings, have been established. The Camp Grounds equipped and paid for, Beulah being in full working operation for twenty-five years, and many great preachers have preached the glorious gospel of holiness to many thousands of people, with telling effect. Many hundreds of people have been converted and many blessedly sanctified wholly during the past twenty-five years.

Riverside Camp Meeting is to celebrate its fifteenth anniversary under our management Aug. 2-12, with a splendid record of many thousands more people who have listened to the gospel of freedom from sin, and hundreds more have been saved and sanctified wholly under burning messages given by the men of power who have preached there. This gives this little denomination a record of forty-five grand camp meetings beside many conventions and other special revival services where an aggregate of thousands of people have been definitely blessed under their ministry, and the ministry of their denominational organ, the King's Highway, which also celebrates with the next issue, July 15th, its 30th year.

Another great spiritual and material success that God has given us is:

Our Missionary Work and Missionary Farm in South Africa.

About seventeen years ago Dr. H. C. Sanders and Sister Sanders and their eldest children went to South Africa as Reformed Baptist Missionaries. Several years later Brother and Sister I. F. Keirstead (now home) went over to assist at the same station. As a result of the work accomplished, many have heard the message, and many precious jewels have been gathered and a

farm of more than a thousand acres has been purchased, and a permanent mission established with several outposts, and a considerable number of native workers are employed beside Dr. Sanders, Sister Sanders and their daughter Faith and son Paul, and the valuable assistance given by the other children. As we review the outcome of that meeting of thirty years ago when this work was launched we humbly thank God for his wondrous grace and what he has accomplished in these brief years through the humble instrumentalities he has chosen and honored.

OBITUARY.

Reginald N. Phillips.

The sudden death at the Fisher Memorial Hospital of Reginald N. Phillips, the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Chpiman P. Phillips, aged six years and 13 days, came as a shock to their many friends. Little Reginald about four weeks ago was taken ill with a cold and cough, which was evidently the whooping cough, as it was prevalent in town. This soon developed into a swelling of the glands of the throat and neck which was very painful and caused difficulty in breathing, which indicated mumps in a serious form. The little fellow bravely battled against the disease, assisted by loving parents, nurse and physicians, but having a sudden choking spell, it was thought an operation might prolong his life. So on Thursday afternoon he was taken to the hospital, but he never rallied from the operation, as in his weakened condition, the heart gave out. Very much sympathy is expressed for Brother and Sister Phillips in their sudden and sad bereavement, as he was their only child and a very bright and intelligent little lad.

The funeral service took place at 2.30 last Saturday afternoon, and was largely attended by relatives and friends of town and country. The choir of the Reformed Baptist Church sang the beautiful and appropriate hymns, "When He cometh to make up His Jewels," "We'll understand it better," and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus." The pastor, Rev. W. B. Wiggins, gave an address from Isa. 40-41, "He shall feed His flock like a shepherd; He shall gather the lambs with His arm, and carry them in His bosom." The pastor was assisted in the service by Revs. B. Colpitts, H. S. Dow and P. J. Trafton. The pall-bearers were Hedley Colpitts, Harold Campbell, Roy Thornton and Hubert Seely. There were many beautiful floral offerings from relatives and friends. Interment in the town cemetery.
