EDITORIAL.

BEULAM CAMP MEETING.

Beulah Camp Ground was never more beautiful than this present season. The Camp Meeting never had a better attendance.

The interest in the services was excellent. It has been fully demonstrated that the beautiful surroundings and scenery, while admired by all, does not detract from the interest in the services. During the meeting the Tabernacle was the great centre of attraction for young and old.

Evangelist Andrew Johnson preached twice daily, and proved himself an excellent teacher, and a strong and helpful preacher of the Word: Close up to the leading evangelists who have preceded him, at Beulah Camp Meetings, for we have had those who are everywhere considered the leaders in the holiness movement on this continent. One gentleman who had spent some time attending "Billy Sunday's" meetings, remarked to the writer, "Evangelist Johnson is of the "Billy Sunday" type, in his method of preaching, but far exceeds him in the quality of his teaching and preaching."

The people enjoyed his preaching. Many came to the altar and found victory. Brother Johnson has a quaint and striking way of putting many things that combined to please and hold the close attention of the audience, and at the same time to press home the truth, and fasten it in the memory.

Brother Johnson made generous use of his knowledge of the Greek, and was pronounced as very clever by those who were acquainted with that language but of course, it was "Greek" to the masses.

The people must not be surprised if they hear some speak in unknown "tongues," and their preachers practice new gestures, some catch the voice, facial and bodily movements more quickly than the great truths emphasized by them, but

of course these things will be done unconsciously, and will be poor imitations of the original and will produce the corresponding creepy feeling in those who saw and heard the original. The habit of apeing is quite general, but as holiness people get great freedom from bondage it manifests itself in greater bodily activity, and they seem to be more exposed to adopting new and striking gestures. Even some Jews undertook to cast out devils in imitation of Paul; but—with serious results. Despite all things, from all sources, wise, and unwise, from within and without, ment to help, and ment to injure the movement, Camp Meetings as conducted by the Reformed Baptists are a grand spiritual success. than having others to do the work, and pay the bills, while we step about with our Sunday clothes on. Come on!

The Sun Shine Within—It has been many years since we experienced so much wet weather during the camp meeting as this season, but it only kept the fair weather people away. Every available room on Beulah Camp Ground, and in the cottages and homes round about were filled, and there was a real cheer and brightness in the people, and in the services, and in the preaching and singing, that offset the rain without, so none complained, but all were happy, even when they left in a downpour of rain after the meeting closed. "The joy of the Lord is your strength," and gives sunshine under unpleasant circumstances and conditions.

Fifty Added During the Year—Dr. Sanders reports fifty members added to our churches in South Africa during the year. This should greatly encourage those who are supporting Native Workers, and induce others to take up this work, and also increase the missionary offerings this year. We rejoice in the fact that our churches have a live missionary interest, evidenced by their gifts to the work. Let us begin at once, the steady pull counts.

Our Home Missionary Work—The report of our home missionary work of last year is very encouraging. 138 converted in the meetings held, and 51 professed entire sanctification. God surely blessed the work. Rev. H. S. and Mrs. Mullen will continue the work. Brother Dow may look after the erecting of the Meductic Church and the services on that circuit for a time. Our home missionary work is almost self supporting.

Special Good Work Commended.—Two of our pastors were given special commendation by a vote of the Alliance for their good work during the past year under outwardly unfavorable conditions. They were Rev. S. H. Clark, who resuscitated the church at Calais, Maine, and Rev. P. W. Briggs, for his successful work on the New Tusket, N. S., circuit. This does not imply that there was not good work done by any of our pastors, but these were victories achieved where it required special faith and hard work.
