EDITORIAL.

RIVERSIDE CAMP MEETING.

Riverside Camp Meeting was good, but the conditions were different than any previous year, brought about for several reasons, most of which were unavoidable. First, War—This condition is generally noticeable; it has brought about a feeling of semi-depression of spirit generally. This feeling cannot be shaken off, nor risen above even in a camp meeting. Thinking people cannot ignore the fact of its seriousness. One brother termed it as tameness in spiritual life and buoyancy, and reflected on the people repeatedly, only adding to the depression by his reflections. The food regulations had its effect, making it difficult to obtain articles of food for the people. There was no lack of patriotism, and very little murmuring or complaints, but the facts had their effect. Another unavoidable condition which affected the meeting through the week was that the people who are the strength and workers in this camp meeting were compelled to attend to their having, and care of their farms, but despite even this, the evening attendance was good, made up of the people camping on the grounds, and from the near-by villages. Another thing that affected the meeting which possibly might have been avoided was the absence of several of our ministers for more or less of the time, which was a serious loss in spiritual power, and had a depressing effect on those who were present for the whole meeting. Brethren are apt to think that because we have an evangelist that they can work to greater profit at home at least for one Sunday, which is a mistake.
