A sad accident occurred at Peniac on the evening of July 17th, when Lee Goodspeed, son of Bro. Charles Goodspeed, was struck and instantly killed by a bolt of lightning while playing a game of baseball. The funeral services were held on the following Friday afternoon, conducted by the Rev. E. W. Lester, assisted by Rev. Dr. Harrison, Methodist, and Rev. E. J. Barris, United Baptist. Lee was a bright young man of seventeen years, and his death came as a great blow to the family and neighborhood.

The floral tributes were many, showing the high esteem in which he was held.

In this issue of The Highway is a picture of our late Brother and Sister Jones, accompanied by a sketch of Brother Jones' life. We had received it a few days before he passed away, and before it could be printed we received the notice of his death. It will be needless for us to repeat the facts it contains. Brother Jones was a faithful and consistent Christian, and had stood loyally with the holiness cause from the beginning of the holiness movement in New Brunswick, and the ministers have always found a welcome at his home. Being old in years and in the Christian life, the editor frequently urged him to write a sketch of his life and experience for The Highway, but he felt it would bring him too conspicuously before the public, and declined to do so. We believe it can be truly said of Brother Jones, "He was a good man," and stood for true Christianity and held up the scriptural standard.

He is survived by a son, T. A. Jones, and one daughter, Miss Sadie Jones, who has tenderly cared for her aged father since the death of her mother. These dear old Christian veterans are being called home to rest from their labors, but their memory is blessed.

Brother Jones passed away on June 30th, when all of our ministers were at Beulah. Brother F. W. Foster, being at Lakeville in revival work, was sent for and conducted the funeral service. Rev. Mr. Harlow was also present and took part, and several others spoke highly of the consistent life of our devoted brother. A large congregation were present to pay their last tribute of respect to their neighbor, friend and brother.
