## "DIED FROM LACK OF WHISKEY."

This is the verdict of a nameless personal liberty advocate who last week issued nameless cards to the electors of Toronto. These cards declare that it is "A Fact" that "During the last 30 days more deaths have occurred from the want of liquor than there died from the abuse of it in the last thirty years." Even the publisher did not care to put his name on the card, and so we don't know who is responsible for it. But a word as to the "fact." It was estimated that when Ontario was wet about five per cent. of the deaths were due to liquor, which would mean about 7,000 in the year, and in 30 years 210,000, at the same rate. According to the "fact," which no one wants to father, we had had just 210,000 deaths in Ontario during the past 30 days, not, mark you, from the "flu," but from "the want of liquor." We think it would be a difficult matter to get any respectable doctor to testify that there was even one death from "the lack of liquor" during the whole period of the epidemic. But just when our nameless friend was printing his nameless card in some nameless office, the police of Toronto were congratulating themselves and the city on the fact that the "peace celebration," one of the biggest things Toronto ever saw, was conducted in such orderly fashion that the police were scarcely needed. More than one man declared that "he didn't see a drunken man the whole day." And just a short time before this the city of Philadelphia, with its 2,500,000 people, face to face with the "flu," deemed it wise to "close the saloons," and for five days Philadelphia was dry, and Captain of Detectives Souder states that it was a revelation to him, as "Crime and every conceivable sort of vice, from thievery to plain, ordinary drunken brawls, were brought to a standstill as a result of the closing up of the booze joints." We would like to know the name of the man who gave out the "fact" upon that nameless card. — The Christian Guardian.
