EDITORIAL.

DON'T KNOCK.

We noticed on a button on the lapel of a brother's coat recently the words, "Don't knock." We have heard a contemptuous reference to one who pointed out men's wrong doings plainly as a "knocker." A gentleman who evidently did not enjoy hearing men's sins too strongly pointed out, read to us a bit of poetry which set forth the utter repulsiveness of one destanted as a "knocker." Of course we did not know any such people who made themselves so obnoxious to right living people of specially refined sensibilities, but we did know some whom the world instnictively despised.

Jesus said, "The world cannot hate you; but me it hateth, because I testify of it, that the works thereof are evil." Further back than the time when our Lord uttered these words Isaiah spoke of men's contempt for God's word, who said, "Prophesy not unto us right things, speak unto us smooth things." In other words, "Don't knock."

We met a minister on the street of a city with whom we spent a few minutes in conversation, in the course of which he asked, "How is it that you people create so much opposition to your preaching of holiness? Why I preach holiness, he said, and no person ever gets stirred up against me that I know off." Well, brother, we replied, in your method of preaching, how many have you led into the experience of entire sanctification? Oh, well, he replied, I don't know that I have led any into the experience. Very true, we replied, at times we stir up a fuss, but we succeed in getting some blessedly saved, but if you can show us a more successful way we will gladly adopt it. A man as gentle as a dove, who will hold up before men their heart sins, and the sins quite generally practiced, and the uncleanness of men's habits, according to the scriptural standard as set forth by our Lord and the Apostles, as the normal life of the true

children of God, the great mass of people would turn from him and apply to him some contemptuous appellation. As they said of Jesus that he was mad, and had a devil. No! No! Don't be a knocker. There is a possibility of a man dropping down to a bitter spirited "knocker" and be deluded into thinking he is preaching the gospel. We have heard some who came dangerously near it. Who did not manifest the spirit of love. Paul exhorts "to preach the truth in love."

There are two extremes, those who for fear, or favor, prophesy smooth things, and the loveless "knocker" both are dead failures, for they surely miss the mark. God save us from so great a death as either.
