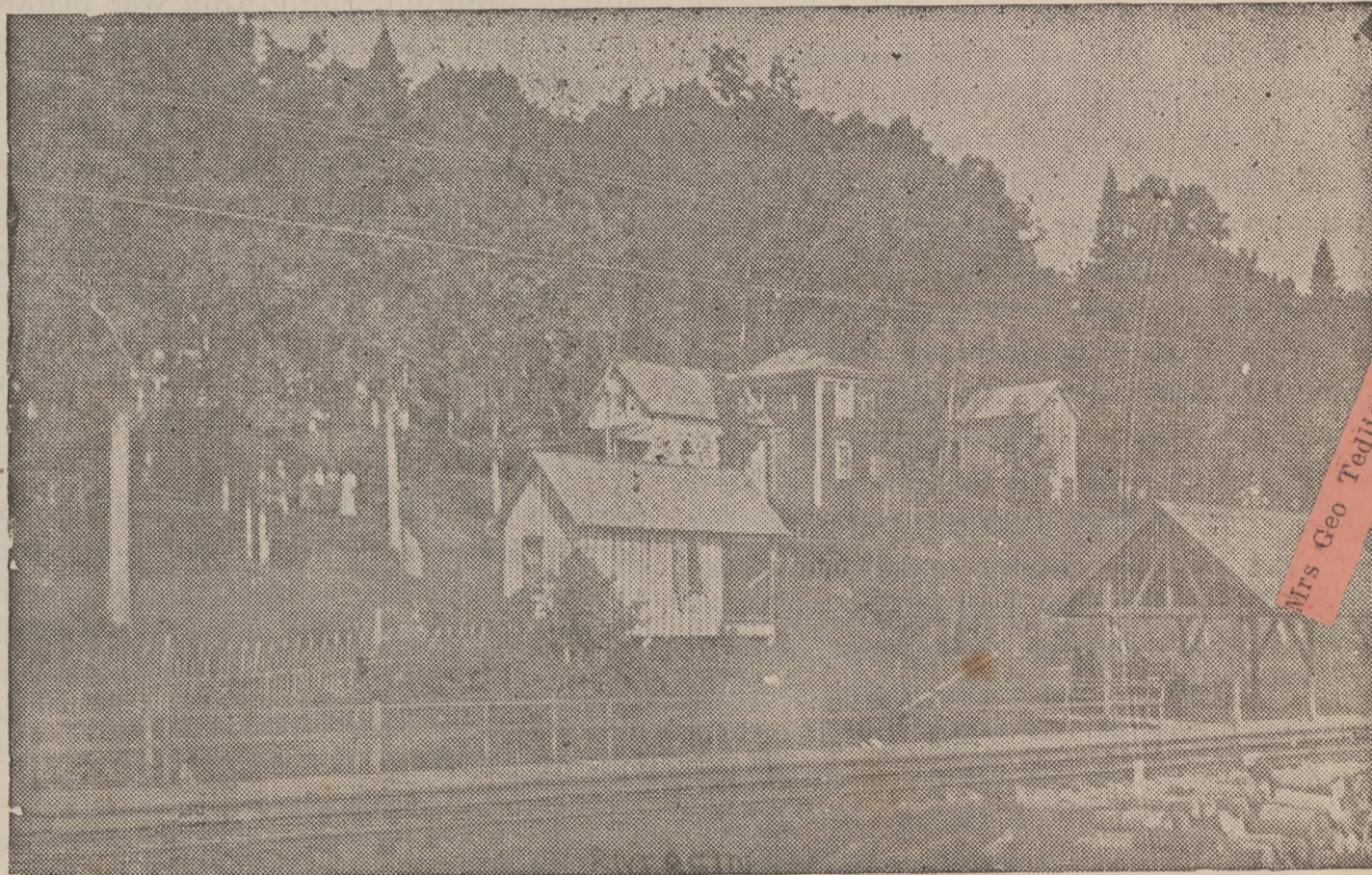
HOW TO GET TO RIVERSIDE.

Railways:—C. P. R. to Houlton, Maine, or Fort Fairfield, and Bangor & Aroostook R. R. will take you to Riverside Camp Ground from either place.

St. John Valley R. R. to Centreville, secure automobile, 8 mile ride to Riverside Camp Ground.

Teams and automobiles from Woodstock will find good roads direct via Centreville. Note the date: Aug. 8-17. For further particulars write Rev. S. A. Baker, Moncton, N. B.

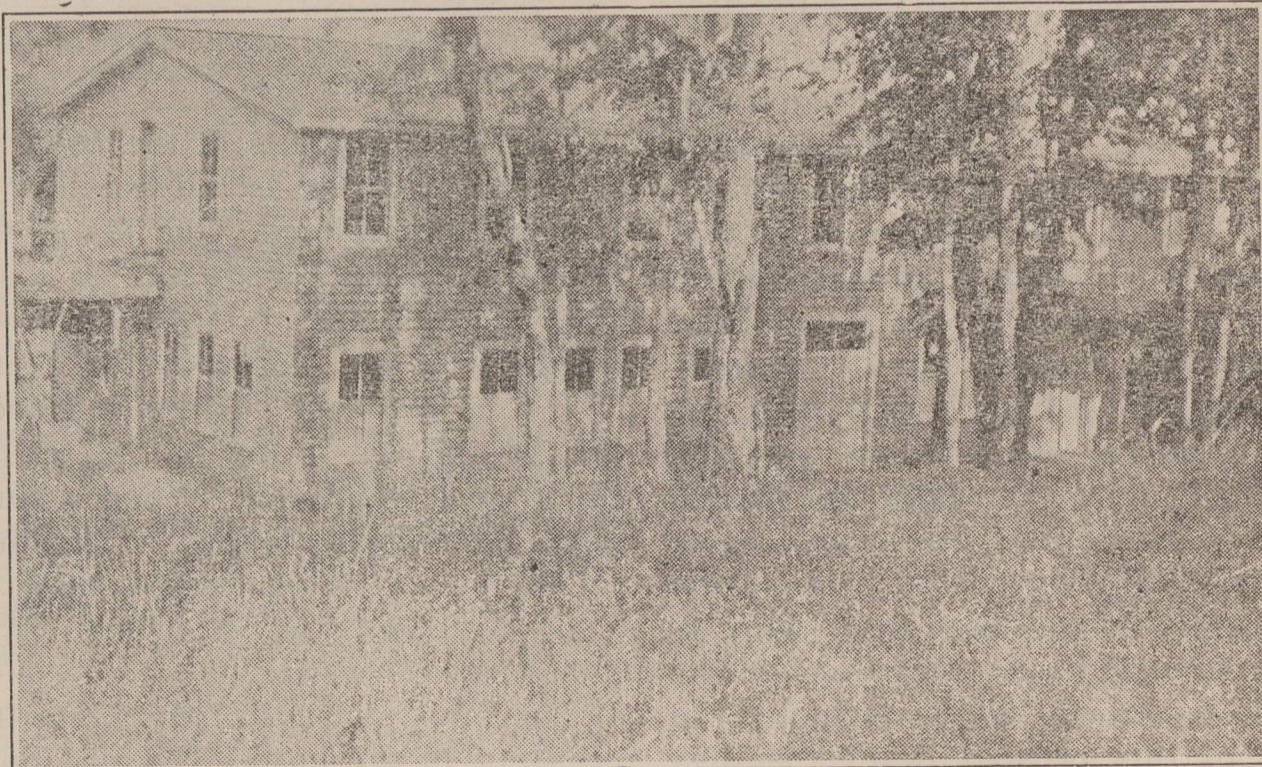
RIVERSIDE CAMP GROUND.

Riverside Camp Ground is situated near Robinson Station on the Bangor & Aroostook Railroad, about two miles from the base of Mars Hill.

Riverside Camp Ground is centrally located, only one quarter of a mile from Robinson Village, five miles from Bridgewater Village, two miles from Blaine, three miles from Mars Hill Village, three miles from Bairds Mills, N.B., six

miles from Tracy's Mills, N. B., eight miles from Centreville, N. B. This ensures a good attendance through the week.

The people of all Christian denominations for thirty or forty miles around look forward to Riverside Camp Meeting as the great religious event of the year, and we believe it stimulates the spiritual activities of all the churches of this whole region of country.
