It was a great shock to the community when it was learned on Sunday morning, July 6th, that Frank W. Nixon, a young and prosperous farmer of Lower Brighton, was dead. He went to Woodstock Saturday night by auto to meet friends coming on the late train. In his absence a large pure bred Holstein bull broke loose and became somewhat enraged. The animal had always been kind and had been handled without fear, so on his arrival home Mr. Nixon thought he would have no trouble with him, but the animal crushed him against the side of a building, injuring him internally. Everything was done that medical skill could do, but to no avail. Brother Frank was 36 years of age. He was born at Lower Brighton, where he had always lived with the exception of two years spent at Hartland. He was converted at the age of  $9\frac{1}{2}$  years, uniting with the R. B. church, professing sanctification a year or so later. In 1908 he married Miss Effie Hoskin, who survives him. He was a leading man in the community and highly respected by all who knew him. He leaves to mourn their loss, besides his wife, three children—Elva, Glenn and Eunice; his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. D. H. Nixon, of Hartland; two brothers, G. Berton, of Somerville, and Dolph E., of Victoria; a large circle of other relatives and a host of friends. The funeral service was held at his home on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, where a great congregation assembled to pay the last tribute of respect to a good man. The flowers were beautiful, silent tokens of love and friendship. A mixed choir rendered appropriate selections. The writer had charge, assisted by Revs. E. A. Trites, U.B., P. J. Quigg, P.B., T. S.
