### RIVERSIDE CAMP MEETING.

This Camp Meeting is a point of interest to our people scattered abroad over this. continent who for years past attended and helped to establish this grand, and to many hundreds, sacred place. As a very large number have found Christ as their great Saviour, and the Holy Spirit as their Sanctifier at this place during the past As we write we think of twenty years. Brother E. M. Smith and Brother and Sister J. H. Seeley, now of California, who were specially active workers here for a number of years, and others who attended services here, and drank from the streams of spiritual blessing, and felt the stirrings of holy love which flowed from heart to heart. Also the evangelists who brought messages to the thousands of people who came year after year, are still interested to know about Riverside, and its welfare.
