DOCTOR'S OPINION OF DRINK

In his inaugural address as president of the American Medical Association in Chicago, Dr. Arthur D. Bevan was enthusiastically cheered as he called upon the 126,000 members and fellows of that body to help to abolish drink as a military and efficiency necessity, says the Standard. "There can be no doubt," he said, "of the injurious effects of alcoholic drink on both the physical and mental well-being of our population. There can be no doubt that the greatest single factor we can control in the interests of the public health of the nation would be the elimination of alcoholic drink. I want to plead," he continued, "for the united action of the organized medical profession of this country to secure the protection by law against the injury drink is doing our people, not as a political measure, but as the most important public health measure that could be secured. In this crisis, when we and our allies are fighting not only for ourselves but also for humanity and civilization, we must organize the nation in the most efficient way possible, and this cannot be done without eliminating drink." We are glad to know that the highest medical authorities are arrayed on the side of all true Prohibitionists for the elimination of the greatest curse that has ever fastened itself upon the American people.

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THE WORD THAT FOCH CHANGED.

Real surrender holds nothing back. It is said that when the tentative armistice terms to be granted Germany were submitted to Marshal Foch, he quickly changed the word "abandon" to "renounce." The Captain of our salvation once used the same word. The word "forsake," in the Authorized Version of Luke 14:33, has been properly changed by the American Revision to "renounce" so that the passage reads: "Therefore whosoever he be of you that renounceth not all that he hath, he cannot be my disciple. "Renounce" is defined thus: "To declare strongly, with more or less of formality, that we give up some opinion, profession, or pursuit forever." Renounce is the strongest "give up" word in the language. Are we clinging, even in thought, to any sin, even a little one, or is Paul's statement ours, too: "What things were gain to me, these have I counted lost for Christ?"—Sunday School Times.

A POSITIVE INSULT.

The Bible positively and emphatically prohibits sin of every kind. There is no question in the matter every candid man, even an unbeliever will admit it. It also declares as positively that the object of the religion of Jesus Christ is to save from all sin.
