

QUARTERLY MEETING.

OBITUARY.

Wilbert T. Cavanagh.

On Monday, May 19th, Wilbert T. Cavanagh, of Calais, was fatally injured while at work in the Fertilizer Plant in St. Stephen. He died Wednesday, May 21st, at Chipman Hospital. Deceased was born at Parrsboro, N. S., in 1873. He was the son of William and Rachel Allen Cavanagh. He was married in 1908 to Jessie E. Stewart, who with three small children survive him. Besides these there are five brothers, James E., of Central Economy, Colchester, N. S., Henry, of East Mines, Colchester N. S., David M., of New Glasgow, N. S., Peter of St. David, and John A., of Calais. One sister, Altha J., passed away several years ago in the west. Mr. Cavanagh was a steady, industrious man, and his family have the sympathy of the community in their great sorrow. Funeral services were held at the home on Friday last, conducted by Rev. S. H. Clark, of the Reformed Baptist Church. Interment was made in the Calais Cemetery.
