ter, Edith Vita, and a son, J. Rus-
sell; also by two brothers, William F. and
Howard P. Cogswell, of Fort Fairfield.
Another brother, George A. Cogswell, was
a resident of this place, but died about
two years ago.

Mrs. Joseph Lyons.

1919, of pleuro-pneumonia, following an
attack of influenza, Mrs. Alice Lyons, wife
of Joseph Lyons. The deceased was 58
years of age and leaves to mourn, besides
her husband, five daughters, Mrs. Percy

ville; Mrs. Bruce Cameron, of Devon, and
Miss Katie, at home; also three sons, An-

Lyons was a member of the R. B. Church
at Marysville, and possessed a good Chris-
tian experience and died triumphant in

George T. Harrop.

Late Tuesday night friends in this city
received a message from Northport, N. S.,
stating that Mr. George T. Harrop had
passed away at that place about ten
o'clock last night. Word of Mr. Harrop's
critical illness with pneumonia at the
home of his daughter, Mrs. W. S. Bran-
der, had previously been received here.

Mr. Harrop was well known in Mon-
cton and had been here very recently, be-
ing apparently in his usual state of health.
News of his death therefore will come as
a painful surprise to his many friends and
acquaintances in this city.

The late Mr. Harrop, who was 72 years
of age in February last, was a native of
Olden, Manchester, England, and had been
a resident of Moncton for forty-five years.
He had been employed in the C. G. R.
shops for thirty-five years. He was a first
class painter and enjoyed more than a
local reputation as a sign painter and ar-
tistic decorator. He retired from the C.
G. R. service about ten or twelve years
ago, and while still calling Moncton his
home, spent a portion of his time with
members of his family in Nova Scotia. He
was an active member of the Moncton
Reformed Baptist Church and took a keen
interest in the affairs of that congrega-
tion.

Deceased is survived by four sons and
four daughters. The sons are: Austin, of
Sydney; A. O., of Calgary; George and
Guy, of Moncton. The daughters are Mrs.
F. H Wells, Vancouver; Mrs W. F. Wolfe,
Lowell, Mass; Mrs. W. S Brander, North-
port, N. S., and Mrs. C. C. McCallum, of
Sunny Brae. He is also survived by one
brother and two sisters in England.

Mrs. Harrop predeceased her husband
some years.

Brother Harrop was deeply interested
in the remodelling of the Moncton Church
and enjoyed himself very much in the
services on his last visit, a few weeks ago.
His remains will be buried beside those of
his wife at Sunny Brae.

Nettie M. Noble.

Death entered the home of Brother Mil-
ford Noble at Houlton, Me., Thursday,
March 6th, 1919, taking from his side his
loving wife, Nettie M., who had been his
faithful companion for thirteen years,
pneumonia being the cause of her death.
She was born at Lower Brighton, in the
year 1882. She gave her heart to the Lord
early in life, being baptised when 13 years
of age, uniting with the Reformed Baptist
Church. Brother and Sister Noble re-
moved to Houlton a few years ago and on
request were given their letters of dismis-
sion and united with the F. B. Church. Sis-
