MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENCE.

Hartland P. O., Natal, South Africa, Feb. 2nd, 1919

Dear Friends:

Does missions pay? Yes, a thousand times, yes!

Three young girls baptized and received

into the church today. The church was crowded, one hundred and ten, good services and many new ones present. One young heathen wife gave herself to Jesus, and seems like she will make a bright star. There are many discouraging things that seem to hinder the work at times. Here is a case. Many native doctors are accepting this new thing practising their art with the help of evil spirits. "Spirits of the boys" these demons are called, and these doctors claim they have power to cause these to enter into the sick person and these spirits will eat up the disease, so the patients will get well. If only these people had eyes to see they would know they were only being deceived, for many today have been so treated but remain the same. This case I wish to tell about is the daughter of a former witch doctor, now dead. Years ago when we first came to this farm, pitched our tena and began to live here, this woman, then about fifteen, often came for one thing or another. She used to laugh about being a Christian and say she wanted to get a husband first. Well, she got her husband, but it was not the one she would have chosen. Her father chose him, an old man and one with a surly temper. She has lately been seeking Jesus. Then came Spanish influenza; her baby died and she herself was very sick with it. She was left very weak and nervous, unable to plant in her garden, etc. This husband heard of some one like her being treated by a certain doctor so he brought her one day, asking for the loan of a donkey to

earry her to this man. to be kept with us, etc. I saw part what she needed was good, nourishing food and rest. Well, after considerable palavar, I gained my point. In one week she was greatly improved so she stayed on for about three weeks. Now after about two months she is almost entirely well and says she has given herself to Jesus. There is much you must read between the lines, much of annoyance from the husband; Many times she was discouraged and ready to run away, etc., etc., but today my heart sings for joy that I intervened.

Wednesday a. m. Bible Class is a season of blessing. The really hungry ones get there and enjoy eating from God's word. These are some of the times I thank God for enlightening my eyes to behold wondrous things in his law. How could I teach these if I had never been taught myself? Then the fellowship of these spiritual children enlarges my own heart. Oh, 'tis wonderful that those who so few years ago sat in such darkness should now enjoy walking in the light of God.

More Dutch neighbors are coming in this way for a time. If only could speak to them in their own tongue! But I have not taken time to learn this. However, I do try to do the work of the Lord as he gives me opportunity, but often I must

I think they are learning we want to be afresh with the Holy Ghost. Amen! neighborly and they accept from us what they would not tolerate in some ithers.

Faith was left weak and nervous from Spanish influenza, but with care is recovering and has gone on a visit to some friends in Vryheid.

We are trying to work up a real school here so as to be able to have a better teacher for our own. Education is such a problem in this land. Of course boarding schools do exist but the expense for several children is very great and often they do not gain enough extra to warrant such, that is, at the boarding schools.

There is to be baptism also across the Pongola at Entungwini if Dr. Sanders can cross the river.

More and more we are seeing that God chose this place for our centre. Just off this farm, across a small river and on the next farm a mine for manganese is to be opened at once. A small beginning is to be made this week. We have an outpost very near the site which gives us the opening and we intend to use it to our best. Several miles from this and near another outpost another mine is said to start soon. Keep praying for us that we do not grow weary but that the fire may keep burning in our hearts. If these mines do really get started we shall need more workers at once so as to hold these various places that will become centres for many natives. Also pray that our Christians may be kept from the evils that mining always brings with
