EDITORIAL.

But to be true to his song perhaps in some cases he might need put in a proviso—If the place and salary are to my liking! Or the church may pray for a pastor, like a farmer is said to have prayed for a crop

of potatoes, and dictated to the Lord as to size and quality.

Beloved brethren, ministers and people. let us stop and listen and hear his voice.

"That we may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God."

And there will be no mis-fits, nor failures, in the success of our work.

Let the pastors sing with true and submissive heart and mean it.

"Where He lead me I will follow." And let the churches pray and mean it.

Lord send salvation by whom thou wilt, and we will acept thy messenger and stand by him.
