Dear Sir:

I appreciate your paer very much and especially your attitude on moral conditions of our country as well as on the temperance question.

As I was inspector under the Canada Temperance Act for twenty-five years and have seen some of the terribleness of that terrible curse, the liquor business, and now to see that the Government was forced under existing conditions to make provision for permitting liquor for sacramental purposes. Now, if there is any church that uses alcoholic liquor for the sacrament the sooner they take down their sign and close the better. Do they not know that many that has been a drunkard and have reformed, and in order that he may be helped in every way, goes to the church, and wishing to remember his Saviour, partakes of the sacrament, only to find his old enemy is aroused and the old hankering takes a grip on him that is too strong for him to risist and down he goes to a drunkard's grave.

Now we notice another provision for medicinal purposes. Forty-one years ago had a hard run of the typhoid fever; the doctor gave me brandy which was only adding fire to fire. Was in bed six weeks when we employed another doctor who did not prescribe liquor but whose medicine made a decided improvement in two days time and the family believe he saved my life. It seemed that if I had been in the habit of drinking would have gone overboard for I had begun already to have a hankering and began to look forward for the time to come to take my medicine.

Alcohol in all its forms is a curse without any redeeming features.

There were four inspectors in the county before myself who did not bother the American line. The very first winter we had it to look after we secured seven convictions. It was a hard proposition to drive them out, as they lived on the Maine side and would go from one side to the other when the officers appeared. We seized large quantities, all the way from one to three two-horse loads in a place.

Right behind our barn in a field was a small frog pond with a great number of frogs in it and a good sized rock at one edge. That winter we poured out a large quantity of liquor, breaking the bottles on the rock until the liquor ran all over the pond, dissovling the snow and ice. All this time was agent for the S. P. C. A. and used to warn the boys not to stone the frogs, which they were sometimes in the halbit of doing, but the next two years the old pond was a place of silence, not a frog leaft to break the stillness. Later on they caame back, but I did it in ignorance of the resault.

There was a great deal of sediment in the bobttom of the barrels and kegs and

especially one cask of wine that I do not think had one gallon of pure wine in it, for on the bottom was five inches of congealed logwood and other mixtures that you could scrape up with your hands. The worst adulteration I ever saw.
