Dear Brother Baker and the Highway Readers:

It has been a long time since you have heard from me directly, but I want to say that I love you all and am glad to read of you through the Highway.

You know that the Lord has been so good as to spare our lives and bring us back from India to our own land again. We praise him for this and also because he has spared all of our loved ones who were here so we could have the pleasure of meeting them again in this life. Truly His mercies are many and wonderful. You also doubtless heard that the Lord took one of our missionary party and family to him just before we left India, Mrs. Perry, who was Mrs. Tracy's mother who went to India with us more than fifteen years ago. The Lord must have seen that she could serve him more fully there than here, so he took her.

We landed in San Francisco on the 21st

September and reached our home in San Diego, the second day after. We found my mother at the station in just the same place that we left her more than seven years before. She has aged somewhat, but is still active. A couple of days after reaching home, I came right on to our great General Assembly held in Kansas City.

We have been having a very nice period of rest in sunny California while the colder parts of the country have been suffering with great cold and unusually severe weather. We have needed only a little gas heat in the mornings and the evenings to take the chill off the room. We are very much improved by the rest and I am now on my way to the eastern states to assist in a missionary campaign among our churches there.

May God bless you in your work. The Reformed Baptists in New Brunswick have contributed not a little to the forces of holiness all over the continent. Very often in my travels, I meet someone active in Holiness work who got started with the Reformed Baptists. Not a few of these came under the indirect influence of holiness there through knowing that there was such a people, or attending some of the meetings, or knowing some of their neighbors who had the experience or through the opposition that holiness stirred up, but they did not seem to get out while in New Brunswick, but under other surroundings have gotten the blessing and are now stalwart holiness people. There are many such and I wanted to tell you of it for the encouragement of the people.
