BEULAH CAMP MEETING

Neither do we permit people to present nor press the people in attendance for contributions for private or other purposes. We want the people to feel that there is one place that has a higher object than the mighty dollar, even when wanted for worthy objects.

There are financial needs to be met, that are incidental to the meeting, such as the traveling expenses of our pastors and for the evangelist and missionary offerings, and for improvements, and for "The King's Highway." These things of general interest must be considered and met, but the people do not feel these things to be burdensome.

But this is a day of financial schemes of endless variety and every large religious gathering is marked as a special opportunity. Let us have one place where people are permitted to talk of and think about a time and place where money will be unknown. Men are becoming weary of the continual pull for money.

Is not a place for the propaganda of modern religious fads.

Justification by faith, as the great fundamental work of divine grace, in the plan of the redemption of mankind, has been held before the world from the days of Abel.

And Entire Sanctification, the second great fundamental work of grace, has been demonstrated before the world since the days of Abraham.

These are the two great essential works of grace that Beulah Camp Meeting has stood for for twenty-seven years. These are the fundamental doctrines of Christianity upon which every sound doctrine that results in the salvation of men, is based, and should be acceptable to every true lover of Jesus Christ of every Christian denomination. These are the great foundation stones of the doctrine of Jesus Christ. Beloved, let us hold to the standards, and not spend the precious time of

these few days in discussion of speculative doctrines, or non-essential themes. Let us pray for a great time of refreshing from the presence of the Lord.

OUR MISSIONARIES AND MISSIONARY WORK.

God, in His wonderful love, has preserved our missionary family in Africa, Dr. Sanders and Mrs. Sanders, and their eight children, without a break by death and in practically good health, during these past years of awful harvest by war and diseases, and permitted the work to go on without interruption, and provided the needful financial support so that we have been able to send their salaries regularly. And while the world has been rent by wars, and troubles of every possible character have swept over the nations, our little missionary work has gone on undisturbed and with a steady harvest of souls from the native heathen state, where the gospel has never reached before.

NEW MISSIONARIES HAVE BEEN CALLED.

And have responded, and we are furnished with two excellent workers, saved, and baptized with the Holy Spirit, and full of holy zeal for the salvation of the darkened heathen with every power on the altar, and finely trained for medical missionary service. Truly called of God and fully prepared of God for His own service.

FINANCIAL PROVISIONS.

This has been our banner year for financial provisions for our missionary work. The people have contributed more for the Native Workers' Fund than in any previous year. A thousand dollars has already been given toward the outfit and passage of our new missionaries. This is only the beginning of what we will need, but we feel fully assured that ample means will be forthcoming as we need it. This will be the most needy department at the present for generous contributions. We need an addition to our church building at the missionary station. We need a teacher for our missionary children. We need a comfortable little house for our new missionaries, when they arrive in Africa. But don't get alarmed at the amount required. God is stirring the hearts of the people to systematic giving. Let us move up as fast as God Provides and opens the way.

OUR HOME MISSIONARY WORK.

This part of our work must be taken up with greater zeal, and let us pray that God will give us workers for it.

There is no more important department of our work than this, and it requires God-called workers, with this burden on their hearts and gifts specially adapted to it, as in every other phase of the cause of God. And we should distinguish between home missionary work and evangelistic work.

WE SHOULD HAVE EVANGELISTS OF OUR OWN.

We cannot expect professional evangelists to have the same interest in conserving our interests as those who have the work at heart. We are sorry to think that there is developing a professionalism, and a "wire pulling" for calls, in the present-day evangelism. It is not very complimentary to say of any class of men, but this is a day of the most general use of the

finest art of the working of wires in all lines that the world ever knew, and the people used by the wire-puller are as innocent as babes, and would be shocked if you told them, as their confidence has been won. These methods are degrading to the cause of Christ. The preacher or the evangelist called of God, will surely be called of men, without manipulations of his own, and we are charitable enough to believe that some good honorable men fall into this habit, quite unconsciously, because it is becoming so generally practiced, the same as people raising money for the cause of God by methods that a good, self-respecting man would feel ashamed to have employed to pay his salary.

Men, when they discover the artfulness, or more charitable to say, weakness of poor humanity, will ask, Why do men appear to have success? Our only answer is: God will honor His word, even when spoken by an ass. (See 2 Pet. 2:15-16.) The success is not of the man, but of the word preached.

This does not go to say that there are no true men. There are true, honorable men in all walks and professions. The Church and the world could not stand without them.

When God wanted to send His great message of salvation to the lost world, He selected ordinary men, and made them extraordinary by His divine grace and power. God will do it again, if the men He calls will respond as the fishermen did, of whom He made apostles.

WE NEED STRONG, CONSECRATED MEN AND WOMEN IN OUR CHURCHES.

Every worker, and officer in the church, and every member of the churches should feel their responsibility for the success of every department of the work. Not least among these are the Sunday School Superintendent and teachers. One of the greatest problems of the churches generally of all Christian denominations is to find Sunday School teachers who can be depended upon. With all the good Sunday School work and methods being employed, the irregularity of the attendance of the teachers continues an unsolved problem. Making all allowance for all kinds of unavoidable hinderances, it does seem that the Sunday School teachers should realize the great importance of their work, and would not for their own pleasure, or any other ordinary reason, absent themselves from their post of duty.

The automobile is proving to be a great enemy of the Sunday School, and the Sunday services. It is quite wonderful how so good a thing can be injurious.
