CLOSE OF WATER STREET MISSION.

There are few Canadian people who have not heard of the Water Street Mission in New York City, which was founded by the celebrated Jerry McAuley as a refuge for the down-and-outs of America's greatest city. When Jerry died, Col. S. H. Hadley, himself a convert of the mission, took charge, and ran it successfully for some years. And now the mission has been closed, simply because the class which patronized it has disappeared. Last Christmas this mission, as usual, provided free dinner for all who chose to come. It expected 1,800, and made provision for that number, and only 450 came; and other missions which also had provided free dinners had not even a single caller. Prohibition did it. And now this unique mission has been closed, simply because the closing of the saloon had robbed it of its constituency. We know of few more striking illustrations of the effectiveness of prohibition than the closing of this mission. The old argument that you can't make men sober by Act of Parliament is seen to be a most inaccurate and misleading statement, for the drnnks have evidently disappeared in very large measure. They are not dead; they are simply sober.
