BEDDING FOR BEULAH AND RIVERSIDE CAMP MEETINGS.

For years there has been a steady and large increase in the attendance at Beulah and Riverside Camp Meetings, and when the crowd arrived the Rooms Committees were much embarrassed because of the shortage in the supply of bedding.

Now is the time to take this matter into consideration and provide for this need. There are several ways in which there could be abundant provision made.

1st, we are of the opinion that hosts of people are in possession of a large amount of bedding in heavy quilts and blankets and other articles of bedding, above the amount that they use, packed away, that they can spare. We can use it for them, if they will give it to the Alliance.

2nd, there is much good material in garments that are hanging in the attics, and clothes closets that could be pieced into excellent quilts that would do good service for years. People camping are not fussy about the color, or many colors of a good clean warm quilt, on a cool night.

3rd, If everybody, or half of everybody would love themselves as much as they expect somebody else to love them, they would provide their own top bedding, by taking it with them, and take it out of the bundle when they get to the camp ground and say to the committee, You can have the top bedding that is in my room, and use it for some person else, as we have brought plenty of our own. Do you know, he would suspect right off, that they were big hearted Christians.

Some of our women are already at work to supply this need. Let it become general.

We need quilts, puffs, blankets, pillows, sheets and pillow cases.
