**THE WORLD'S SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.**

The World's Sunday School Convention meets in the city of Tokyo, Japan, on Oct. 5th to 15th, 1920, and it is expected that quite a few Canadian delegates will take time to attend. The convention will meet in a building specially constructed for it at a cost of \$75,000, on a site close to the Emperor's palace. This building will be prepared to accommodate at dinner about 1,000 delegates. The Japanese people themselves are very much interested in the convention, and Japanese homes will be open to accommodate from 500 to 800 delegates. Special arrangements are also being made to allow the delegates ample opportunity to visit the various mission stations in Japan, and it is probable that not a few of the delegates will take the opportunity to visit also some of the missions in Korea and China. All the Canadian delegates should get their credentials from the Canadian Committee, of which Rev. Dr. F. C. Stephenson is chairman and Rev. H. C. Priest, 538 Confederation Life Building, Toronto, is secretary.
