TEMPERANCE REPORT.

Your committee on Temperance in making their report this year, are pleased to note the advancement that has been made in the temperance cause during the year. The United States as a nation, has adopted and put in force the amendment in their constitution prohibiting the importation, manufacture and sale of any alcoholic beverages and although some of the States in the Union, which are not in favor, have tried to defeat the measure, it has been fully sustained by the highest courts in their land.

In Canada progress is being made in the different provinces. In our own province we have been somewhat hindered in enforcing the law, since the Order-in-Council passed by the Federal Government as a war measure was removed. At the present we feel bound to commend the Prohibition Act, and also the untiring efforts of Rev. W. D. Wilson, the chief inspector, and urge that all those who are interested in the welfare of our country cast their ballots for this act, and against the use and sale of light wines and beer at the coming election on July 10th next.

We feel that as a province we face a great crisis, and cannot take any back-steps, but must make advancement.

In the near future we hope to see the law so amended as to make this province practically bone dry. We would therefore urge upon our people the necessity of being deeply interested in sustaining and enforcing the present prohibitory law, and to render whatever assistance that lays in their power to assist the officers in the discharge of their duties.

According to an amendment to the Post Office Act passed during the recent session of Parliament the Registration Fee on letters and other matter mailed in Canada is fixed at ten (10c) cents per each letter or article.

The above fee shall apply to all registered mail matter posted in Canada on and after the 15th July, 1920.
