The work of the Alliance was carried through expeditiously and harmoniously. The reports of the Churches:

Very encouraging reports came from the churches, with very few exceptions there were additions to their membership. and the spiritual condition was strong and thrifty, going against the strong tides that the holiness interest meets, conflict and difficult situations are inevitable.
