TAYLOR UNIVERSITY.

Dr. M. Vayhinger, the president of Taylor University, Upland, Ind., visited Beulah Camp Meeting in the interest of that institution. Taylor University was established as a memorial for Bishop William Taylor, who was appointed Bishop of Africa by the Methodist Episcopal Church. It is recognized as one of the best and strongest educational institutions, definitely devoted to teaching the scriptural doctrines of justification and entire sanctification by faith, the two essential works of grace, as well as a high standard of general education. Many denominations are represented among its students, and no effort is put forth by the Faculty to divert them from the Christian denominations of their choice. Many students who go there unconverted, return to their homes as active Christians, and those who are Christians when they become students are led into the richer and deeper things of the Bible and experience.

We sincerely hope that we can come to an understanding with the Taylor University people so that the Reformed Baptist students will go there until such time as we will be able to establish an educational institution of our own, and it is now proposed that we establish

From which we can loan to those desiring to fit themselves for ministers and missionaries, money that will help them as they may need. So we will open a student fund in the Highway immediately, as several of our young men, and possibly young women would enter as students at the opening of the next term if money is provided to help them, and we ask our people to consider this matter prayerfully and make their contributions to this fund.
