To the readers of the Highway, especially in Aroostook County, who are interested in Riverside Camp Ground, I wish to say that I have completed the purchase of the cottage for which so many of you cheerfully and generously subscribed at the time of the camp meeting. I collected the money and placed it in the Bank at Mars Hill, the last of October. I returned acording to arrangement and found the family had left the camp ground. I got the deed written and duly signed and paid the money, and had the deed recorded at Houlton, and I put a lock on the door and nailed up the windows and have the key in my possession.

This is the last and only family occupying a house on the camp ground the year round, which has been so undesirable and dangerous to the property, and we now can encourage the sisters in the country to contribute as liberally as they please of quilts, blankets, pillows and pillow cases, and all other things which would make these cottages comfortable and attractive. The cottage I have mentioned can be made neat and respectable by small expense for fair sized families of three ministers, thereby leaving the Hotel and Dormitory rooms to rent. Sister Nellie Hartt, of Bangor, Me., has promised the furnishings. Brother and Sister Keirstead will see that it is put in order, cleaned and papered in time for the camp meeting. We understand that Brother and Sister Archer intend to repair the cottage purchased from Mr. Rideout for two more ministers' families.

The grounds are now quiet and respectable the year round; let everyone strive to keep it so. In order to do so I would suggest that all cottagers and roomers observe neatness around their cottages. Persons owning lots and cottages they wish to sell to make the Aliance or Camp Ground committee the first offer, and if they cannot agree, to be careful to sell only to persons who have an interest in holiness camp meetings, so that holiness unto the Lord will be observed indoors and out.

And all cottage owners realize that if they want to spend a few quiet weeks from business and worldly care, that it is their place to observe the rules of the Camp Ground, and if they want to indulge in smoking tobacco, they would kindly resort to the shore of the beautiful stream on the other side of the B. & A. railroad track, and not set the bad example to others.

Also it would be safer to have the windows of the cottages protected by neat shutters or boarded up.

Repairs and improvements have been made by Brother Lilley, of Littleton, and on the Wheeler cottage. A few dollars expended on the W. C. T. U. cottage would be in order.

While all who were asked to assist in the purchase of the two cottages referred to (and now deeded to the Alliance of the Reformed Baptists) Brother Bates of Littleton deserves special mention, as he headed the list with \$50.00, which was given cheerfully and was an inspiration

for me to go forward in the work before me, and before I got through he supplemented it by another offering for the same purpose. Many thanks to the brethren and sisters who contributed, and thanking all in advance for the bedding, and hope to meet you at the camp meeting.
