# REPORT OF QUARTERLY MEETING.

On Friday evening Brother Kierstead delivered a good message from Heb. 12:1. The business session took place as usual on Saturday afternoon. In the absence of the President, Rev. J. H. Coy was chosen chairman. Roll call found present the following ministers and delegates: Ministers-J. H. Coy, W. B. Wiggins, E. W. Lester, P. J. Trafton, I. F. Kierstead, F. T. Wright and H. C. Mullen. Delegates: Fort Fairfield-Brother and Sister Leonard Kinney; Woodstock-Brother Howard London and Mrs. Wiggins; Fredericton-Mrs. L. A. Morrell. The election of officers resulted as follows: President, Rev. J. H. Coy; Secretary, H. C. Mullen; Treasurer, Mrs. Thomas Mitchell; Highway Agent, P. J. Trafton. Reports from the following churches were read: Hartland, Woodstock, Fredericton, Maple Ridge, Marysville and Waterville. Hartland reports that services are all mainfeather pillow, a good comfortable, or tained regularly, and the Lord acording to

Waterville-The church at Waterville sends greetings. We are pleased to submit this our first report. Special meetings were begun here on Feb. 22nd by Rev. H. C. Mullen and Brother Orser. From the first the blessing and powers of God were upon the work, so the meetings were continued for nearly six weeks. Rev. P. J. Trafton assisted Brother Mullen part of the time. Quite a number were converted, some were sanctified and a larger number were greatly blessed. As a direct result this church was organized on March 31st. A Sunday school has been organized, with an attendance of about forty. There is preaching or prayer service every Sunday at the close of the Sunday School and prayer meeting on Friday nights. These services are all well attended and God's presence is real. Besides the written reports verbal reports were given. Brother Lester reported for Penniae that a good interest had arisen in the Sunday School. Brother Norman Cochrane, of Marysville, had taken the leadership of the school and the interest was on the increase. Sister Kierstead reported for Royalton. The interest there was good. Several had been baptized and more would follow. The church has undertaken to build a parsonage. The land had been secured, and a thousand dollars subscribed. Building would begin this fall.
