Last Sunday, May 8th, was big Sunday here at the Station, or in other words it was a reception for the new white teachers who had come across the ocean.

There were about two hundred here, some coming as far as thirty miles. Faith took charge of the morning service, Alice and I each giving a short talk, Faith interpreting for us. It is surprising to see how spiritual some of these natives are; and although we cannot understand their prayer or talks we can feel the spirit in the service, and we are blessed ourselves. In the afternoon about two o'clock there was baptism, seven being baptized. It would have reminded you of home to see us all walking down to the baptismal water singing as we went, Zulu songs of course. After the baptism there was the service, Alice and I each giving another short talk, Paul interpreting for us.

The natives had told the doctor they wanted to give us a present to show their gratitude to us for coming across the ocean to them, so after the doctor had preached to them, he had a table offering. Some of them had ready money, others had to borrow from the doctor, but nevertheless they came with their three pence pieces, and six pence, and quite a number of shillings, which amounted to thirty-eight shillings; almost two pounds all told. Lydia and her husband each brought a hen, and another native woman gave a dish (native made) which was very nice. It surely was touching to see all this as money is very scarce with them. It made us feel like getting the language as soon as we can, so we can help to give them the gospel.

After this the seven were taken into the church and a dear baby presented to the Lord, then the service was closed with prayer and the shaking hands and goodbyes were said, and each left for his home. We are feeling the prayers of the dear home friends. Trusting you will have a good time in the Lord at eBulahmtM xm praying to that end.
