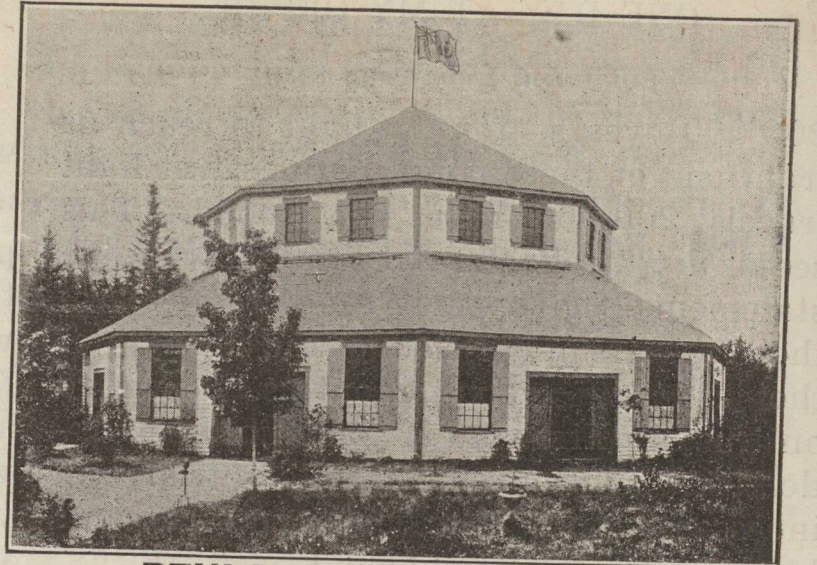
### INFLUENCE.
