Men fail who want the honor of leadership, but refuse the responsibility that belongs to the position.

Peter said, "In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk. And took him by the hand, and lifted him up." It is easy to help a man up spiritually, who really wants to get up—for he will let go of those things which hold him down.

"Honor thy father and mother." Your father and mother 's home was an ideal Christian home. Your father and mother were leaders in the church and in christian experience, and set an excellent christian example before their family and the community.

They never visited worldly places of amusement. Their influence was all for good. But you dishonor them by a life and example directly opposite, and all who know the history of your childhood. Wonder why? Sad indeed. But true of many.

People by their manner and action seem at least to go to church for what they get out of the service, rather than what they put in it. Which should be their incentive? A sponge absorbs and gives out nothing, unless it is squeezed. A beautiful rose cheers and gives out by just being what it is, just a rose.

'Blessed is the man that endureth temptation; for when he is tried he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love him.' It is the man that endures the temptation, and stands, not the fellow that goes to pieces. Things run very smooth until the test comes, which proves the reality of our profession, or our mistaken dream. It is folly to try and convince people about us, that we withstood the wave which swept us miles down the stream and wrecked our frail craft of profession.

Enter your inheritance, use the things to advantage that your predecessors have built up, and improve upon those things, increase the interest, enlarge the work.

This should be the aim of the younger ministers and people who must soon assume the responsibilities of carrying on work of the different departments we have now in operation. The work of the churches. The Alliance, the Camp Meetings, the Foreign and Home Missionary Work, our publication, "The Highway." These things have been built up by prayer, economy, hard labor and much sacrifice. The younger men and women must assume these responsibilites, but they should do it in the right spirit. With due consideration of the grave responsibilities it involves, not in the snse of breaking away, and ruling things, not forgotten the teaching of our Lord, when he revealed to his disciples that hey should not exercise rulership in the spirit of the world, but in the Spirit of Christ, who came not to be ministered to, but to minister. There are cunning and crafty men at work, who are on the alert to grasp the work of others, but our greater danger is among ourselves. "The world spirit of restlessness," and rashness is easily duplicated in the church. Let us beware of these things, and keep humble before God and patiently and gradually take up our responsibilities as the Holy Spirit assigns to each man and woman, as they are fitted for the different positions that must soon be taken. Let us go along the more excellent way. Not by power nor by might, but by my Spirit saith the Lord.
