A Children's Home has been established in Moncton for the care of needy children, which is proving a blessing indeed to a considerable number of children, who would otherwise fare hard. Any person visiting this home for a half hour will be convinced of the need of such institutions in every town of any considerable size.

Another commendable undertaking by the Y. W. C. A. is the establishing of a nice home-like place where young women and girls coming to the city (Moncton) can have a safe place, and agreeable and pleasant associations while visiting the city, or while becoming settled as a resident. This fine, cozy home is situated on Highfield street, just above the corner of the "Brunswick Hotel," directly across from the railway station, about 3 minutes walk.

ANOTHER COMMENDABLE PROVISION FOR THEIR EMPLOYEES.

"The Atlantic Underwear Company, Limited," of Moncton, N. B., has built and finely fitted, and furnished a large brick building for the accommodation of girls and women who work in their factory, where they can have all the conveniences and comforts of a modern home. It is under the management of a competent matron, with all proper regulations, which gives all an equal chance for protection, health, rest and conveniences not to be found where working girls frequently board.

PROTESTANT DETENTION HOME FOR ERRING GIRLS.

The four larger Protestant denominations—Methodist, Baptist, Presbyterian and Episcopal—are uniting in the undertaking of establishing a redemptive detention home, where erring girls and women, who are arrested and convicted by the courts, will be sent and aided to better lives.

The location selected is a very pleasant farm just across the Petitcodiac River, opposite Moncton, N. B.
