## EXPOSITION.

## Rev. Joseph H. Smith.

Question: What is the Wrath to Come? Answer: As to God, it is the heat and fury of His displeasure at sin. This will vent itself in maximum vengeance at the last great day. It is now restrained and held in check by Mercy and will be so until the Day of Salvation is fully past; and the reprieve secured for man by the mediation of Christ is at an end.

Meanwhile there are scintillations of this displeasure in the Providential government of God, rumblings of the thunders of that coming storm are heard, and flashes of its lingtning are seen and passing clouds in the woes and disasters and pestilences which are allowed to evidence His displeasure at sins of nations and wickedness in current events. But "the end is not yet." References to former manifestations of His wrath in the flood, in the fire upon the cities of the plain and the overthrow of the children of Israel in the wilderness are made to keep men in mind that our God is a consuming fire. His character never changes. And there is no respect of persons with Him either as to His wrath or His mercy. The universal and perpetual reign of Death over our race shows us that His laws are inexorable and His sentences are irrevocable. So that when in His fury He must utter the sentence of the Second eDath this, will be as certain and as enduring as when at man's Fall in Eden He spoke the sentence of the first death. For as the sentence of the first death was for man's violation of the laws of his first probation, as, this Second Death is for man's violation of the laws of his second probation. Christianity is man's Second (and last) Probation. God's wrath to come will fall upon those who have rejected and those who have neglected the gospel of His Son.

And since God's wrath is only and altogether at sin, and that any and all sin will incur His hot displeasure, it follows that whosoever neglects so great salvation from all sin as is proffered in the gospel of His Son surely cannot escape, but is heaping up wrath against the Day of Wrath.
