DO MINISTERS NATURALLY CARE FOR THE PEOPLE'S STATE SPIRITU-

ALLY?

We should not count our success by the Church we are called to, nor the size of our congregation.

Paul stated to the Hebrew Church, that their guide or minister watched for their souls, as they that must give an account, that they might do it with joy, and not with grief." See Heb. 13-17. Speaking of Timothy Paul said to the Phillipians:

inave no man likeminded (so dear unto me) who will naturally care for your state.

For all seek their own, not the things which are Jesus Christ's.—Phil. 2-20-21.

This lays a responsibility upon the ministery that is liable to be easily overlooked.

Are we satisfied if people attend regularly and pay promptly? If the attendance is large and the support generous? This is the people's part, but what about the state of their souls? Are they measuring up to the spiritual condition that the Bible demands?

There is certainly trouble ahead for the pastor who is indifferent at this point, and gets along smoothly now.

It is not a question about how loyal these people may be to the church or denomination or how much christian service (socalled) they are doing, but their individual state.

We cannot compell people to accept the fulness of the gospel of Christ, but we can keep the truth before them that the responsibility will be theirs and not ours.

MARK THESE PEOPLE, "AND AVOID THEM."

Now I beseech you, brethren, mark them (men or women) which cause divisions and offenses contrary to the doctrine which ye have learned, and avoid them.

For they that are such serve not our Lord Jesus Christ, but their own belly; and by good words and fair speeches deceive the hearts of the simple.—(Rom. 16-17-

18)—Paul. This bunch are not all dead yet, but are very crafty propagandists. We are so eaxceedingly charitable in these days tha tone is in danger of genral condemnation who repeats Paul's admonition regarding this type of people, because of their profession of religiou. A person of this type can easily adjust themselves to any situation.

Dr. Adam Clarke says: "Look sharply after such, that they do you no evil; and avoid them; give them no countenance.— It is for worldly gain alone, that they keep up the profession of the ministry."

"Yes," we believe in holiness, but we have no fellowship with these Reformed Baptists; they are extreme in their views, and profession, and radical in their preaching. They get on my nerves."

Well; yes, but will you please tell us, What kind of holiness, or sanctification you do believe in, and please state it on paper with your names signed to it. So we can be sure you will stand by what you say.

We don't hear of many sermons being preached on the subject and yet, our Bibles say: Follow peace with all men, and holiness without which no man shall see the Lord.—Heb. 12-14.
