Cantinued from Page 4 might do, if I was not otherwise employed. It is doing as much as I can and more than I can do because she works too. I expect to keep at least one native worker in my employ.

Today my mission work was visiting two European neighbors who are sick, also I called at a kraal where two or three were far from well. One, a child wiht whooping cough. To all I could speak words of comfort and I feel it was profitable. But I am tired as the distance here and back is about 12 miles; the path is rough and worst of all my horse was very unwilling to go, kept turning around and wanting to run off with his friends who were just having a fine time running free. I feared he might throw me so I could not sit free in the saddle, but rather on a strain with every nerve taut watching out for some prank of his. This has tried me more than the ride. Dr. Sanders is still in Durban at the Natal Missionary Conference. I am expecting him to return next week. The winter is very cold and dry, steady cold that congeals all one's energies.

Influenza has again appeared in various parts of Natal and several towns have had a regular epidemic of it, but I hear it is now on the decrease. The Lord does give us such blessings and fills our hearts with praise. The of walliwan from ms. I nis out
