1. To bring any liquor into the Province for beverage purposes;
2. To agree with any other person so to do;
3. To convey liquor through the province unless by a common carrier, and in that case the container must not be opened.

EXCEPTION—Provision has been made in the new law that wine for sacramental purposes may be obtained also liquors for medicinal use through the proper channels.

What Effect Will This Have in Connection With Other Laws?

1. Existing provincial laws while closing places for common drinking allow the rich man to store his cellar with liquor. The new law by cutting off all supply places all people on the same level. No man, no matter how high his office or low his estate will have any right to import intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes.
2. Another federal law recently passed places on any maker of liquor the burden of proving that he had good reason to believe that the liquor made by him would not be disposed of contrary to the law of any Province.

ALL ABOUT THE REFERENDUM

The Federal Government as provided in the Scott Act amended in 1920 asks the electors of the Province of New Brunswick this question: Are you in favor of Prohibiting importation or bringing into the province of New Brunswick liquor for beverage purposes?

Why Does the Federal Government Interfere?

Because while the Provincial Government has control only over local sale the Dominion Government has control over inter-provincial trade. The referendum gives each Province complete self-government in regard to liquor.

Every Province That Has a Prohibition Act in Operation is Given The Right to Vote

New Brunswick having a prohibitory act upon its statute books is entitled to vote on this question. The provinces that have already voted on this issue are Nova Scotia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Ontario. Each province voting dry by a large majority. The new law is already opera-

tive in these provinces with splendid results.

Who Are Entitled to Vote?

Every one is entitled to vote, men or women in urban centres whose names appear on the voter's list. (And an urban centre is a place having a population of more than 2,500 persons and being under the provincial laws as a city, town or incorporated village, or within any other area directed by the chief electoral officer to be treated as urban).

In rural districts men or women over twenty-one years of age and British subjects may vote whether their names appear on the voter's list or not, provided they can be vouched for by responsible electors and are willing to make an oath affirming the above.

How is the Vote Decided?

By a majority of the votes actually cast.
