The Highway has reached the 2nd number of its 34th volume. It has been printed regularly for over 33 years. It has always been kept free from debt, and closed to advertisements. It has maintained its standard of the "Two works of grace," as definite and distinct Christian experiences. The business management and editorial work have been done practically gratuitously. It is the only definite holiness publication printed in the Maritime Provinces. It has stood unwaveringly for scriptural holiness and free from all side issues and non-essential doctrines.

We have survived the war period, and so far the high prices of material and cost of labour and still has a small balance of money in its favor.

But the time has come when the Highway's friends must stand by it-financially. It was decided by the Alliance to ask each of the churches to take the Highway into consideration, each church remembering that the Highway belongs to the Alliance, which is composed of the pastors and delegates of the churches, hence it is the property and general minister of the churches, and is sent out by them on the grand mission of advocating and propagating holiness as a definite second work of grace over this continent.

Among those who have been at Beulah since the close of the camp meeting was a class of "Canadian Girls in Training" from the Fredericton Methodist Church. In dress during the week days they were "Canadian Girls in Bloomers." There was another class of the Canadian Girls in Training stopping outside of the camp grounds. from Wesley Memorial Church, Moncton, who frequently came to the services, and Sunday School. Brother Bullock formed the two classes into a large choir, and they did good work. They were a fine company of young ladies and seemed to enjoy themselves much. There was also a considerable number of young men, and a large number of children about the grounds. There is a very excellent company of people now stopping in and about Beulah. There has been considerable promiscuous bathing at Beulah Beach this season. Some of the bathing suits were in keeping with some of the dresess now worn, and were conspicuous for the economy in goods, and the close resemblance to stationaryhhtsi vceaoqu BywEE lance to statuary in an up-to-date museum.

This with some other matters will need to be taken into consideration by the Alliance. Members of the Alliance executive protested against this abuse of the privileges of those who are in and about Beulah after the close of the Camp Meeting. Beulah has been exceedingly beautiful this season, with perfect weather throughout, and the people generally have seemed to appreciate the privileges and conveiences Beulah affords. St. John River Salmon have been somewhat scarce and high in price, but of the most excellent quality, strawberrries and raspberries have also been high in price, but the splendid quality made the people very willing to pay the price. When we first began renting our dormitory rooms after the camp meeting closed, it was to our own people and we think many more of our own people should plan for a few weeks rest at this very beautiful place, but now other people are enjoying that for which our people have paid and getting a large part absolutely free from cost, true they pay for the use of the cottages and a trifle for the use of the rooms in the dormitory, but nothing for the upkeeping of the grounds. people should, so far as possible, plan to enjoy and to derive as much spiritual and physical benefit from this ideal place as possible.
