Things move on about the same here as usual and all are very busy. The school for native children is doing well so far, and numbers are increasing. Daily class is very helpful and a blessing to all who come. We have one patient who told me yesterday she rejoiced to be able to attend these daily classes as the Lord's word was sweet to her and he was blessing her much. Her mother-in-law is also here and we hope she will get saved.

Very cold weather here just now with heavy frosts nightly, but the bright sunshine during the day is most delightful, and the sunsets are gorgeous. The sisters seem to be delighted with our winter so far.

As I have written so recently there seems little need to add to this letter save God does bless us more and more continually and we know whereof we do believe. We find it sweet to work for him here amid heathen peoples.

Our faith has daily mingled with yours in praying for you all at Beulah and we are awaiting news from there as to victories, the overthrow of that which hinders some of our people from walking straightly in the way of holiness. We certainly must stem this tide of ease, loving worldliness and "the sin that doth so easily beset us," if we would win the day. The devil is a defeated foe, but it seems to me he pretends he is not, and is more sly than ever. It is very surprising to see spiritism flaunted in newspapers and thousands are being deceived.
