A RESOLUTION PASSED AT THE QUARTERLY MEETING AT LOWER BRIGHTON.

We, the Reformed Baptist Quarterly Meeting, convened at Lower Brighton, N. B., March 4th, 1922, hereby resolve that whereas reports are being circulated throughout this province, that some change is contemplated in the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916, so that a system may be introduced for the purpose of raising revenue for the Provincial Treasury similar to the plan followed by the Provinces of British Columbia and Quebec. Therefore resolved we emphatically declare ourselves opposed to any relaxation of the Prohibitory Act of this province for revenue or any other purpose, which would cause this province to revert to a condition that would undo the work of past years.
