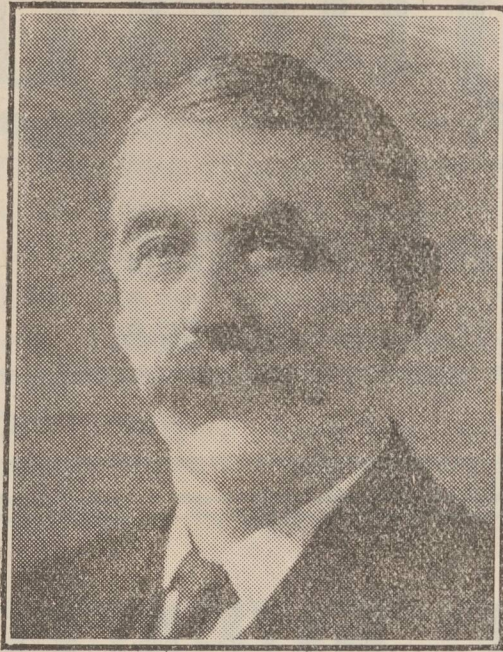


OBITUARY.



Robert Barr.

Deacon Robert Barr departed this life at his home, 214 Queen street, Fredericton, N. B., Saturday, March 18th, at 1.15 o'clock p. m., after an illness of 2 years and six months duration. He was confined to the house a great part of the time since coming from Beulah Camp Ground the first of September last, where he and his wife had spent the summer in their cottage. He bore his long illness without a murmur and great grace was upon him during his months of confinement and his greatest delight was to talk about the matter of salvation and testify to the power of Jesus blood to cleanse and the grace of God to keep in constant victory.

He was born at Scott Settlement fifty-eight years ago last May, where he spent his first few years, the major part of his life was spent at Macniquac, until twelve years ago, when he came to Fredericton. He was twice married, his first wife being Annie Ingraham, of Macniquac, who died over six years ago. His second wife was Mrs. Minnie Dykeman, who survives him, and who has given him every possible attention. Brother Barr united with the Reformed Baptist Church after coming to Fredericton and was elected one of the deacons. He had sought and obtained the experience of "entire sanctification" in a tent meeting held by the writer at Macniquac some 13 years ago and has been a loyal exponent of the experience, and deeply interested in the spread of holiness and the work of the denomination to which he belonged. He leaves to mourn their loss besides his widow, two brothers, William, of Tobique, Vic. Co., N. B., Fred of Macniquac, N. B., one half-brother, Charles Cliff, Preston, Iowa; three sisters, Mrs. Saunders Patterson, of York Mills;

Mrs. Charles Tupper, of Fredericton, Mrs. Wesley Canaghy, Aberdeen, Wash., a large circle of other relatives and a host of friends. The funeral took place Monday morning, a short service being held in the home, after which the body was taken to the church, where a large number had gathered to pay the last tribute of respect. The service was conducted by the writer, assisted by Revs. E. W. Lester, W. B. Wiggins and Z. L. Fash. A small choir sang "The last mile of the way," "The Pearly White City," "No Disappointment in Heaven." A single crescent sent by the W. C. T. U. was the only flowers, as Brother Barr had declared he wanted his flowers while living. The body was taken to Macniquac for interment, Rev. E. W. Lester conducting the service. The Church will miss him, the community will miss him. His last prayer was for the little church. The pastor will miss his fellowship and co-operation, his testimony and prayer. Our sympathy goes out to the widow in her loneliness. He left a clear testimony in life and word. Ours is the Cross; his the Crown. Text 2nd Timothy, 4th Chapter, verses 6, 7, 8.

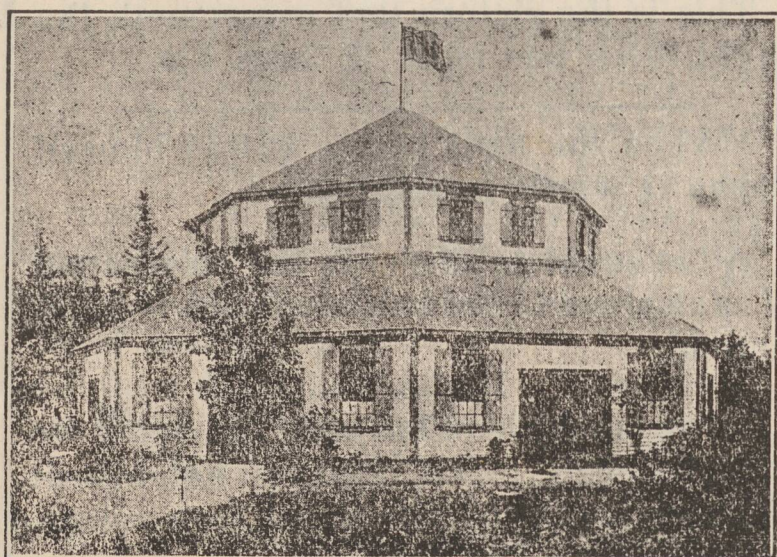

Graham P. Blaney.

It is with much sadness that we report the sudden death of our esteemed brother,

Graham P. Blaney, which took place at his home at Maple Ridge, York Co., N. B., on Wednesday, March 8th, aged 75 years. He left to mourn their loss three daughters, Mrs. Henry Billings, of Houlton, Me., Mrs. Asa Cunningham, of Stillwater, Me., and Mrs. Blanchard, of Presque Isle., Me.; also three sons, Albert, of Stillwater, Me., Manzer, of Littleton, N. H., and Sandy at home. Brother Blaney was born at Prince William, being the youngest of a family of nine children. His mother died when he was only two years of age and the home being broken up soon after, he went to live with his uncle. When he was about 21 years of age he married and came to Maple Ridge to live, being one of the first settlers in that community. At about the age of 35 he was converted, and later while walking in the light he was led to consecrate his all to God, and received what he afterwards found to be the experience of full salvation. When the Reformed Baptist Church was organized at Maple Ridge, Brother Blaney was one of the charter members and later when the church was built he gave the land and was one of the largest contributors to it, and one who always took a deep interest in the welfare of the church. Brother Blaney was a man of more than ordinary talents, and it was his delight to preach the word which he did very acceptably in many of the surrounding districts as well as in his home church. He was a man of cheerful disposition, always having a smile and pleasant word for those he met, and was one who really enjoyed the experience of entire sanctification. He had enjoyed fairly good health of late and had just returned from a visit to his daughters at Houlton and on the way home had stopped at the quarterly meeting at Lower Brighton, where he took a very active part in the services. He had only been home a few days when he became ill and in a short time passed away, the cause of his death being due to heart trouble. The funeral service was held the following Saturday, a short service at his late home, then the remains were taken to the church where service was conducted by his pastor, assisted by Revs. Mr. Budd and Mr. Brooks, after which the remains were laid to rest in the lot which he had provided near the church, and beside those of his beloved wife who had only preceded him a few months ago. Brother Blaney will be much missed in the community as well as by the little church at Maple Ridge.
