RESTRAINING REVELATIONS.

"My little children, these things write I unto you, that ye sin not."—I. John 2:1.

We are not saved by what we do not know. The soul's safety, whether that of pious heathen or well taught Christian, lies not in freedom from responsibility to undiscovered truth, but in obedience to known truth. Ignorance may seem blissful; it is always dangerous. Our peril is not that we know too much but that we only partially comprehend truth or, else, hold positive error as true. Inspiration has back of it a clearly revealed purpose.

The revelation that holds men back from sin dwell close to this passage. God is holy. No darkness gathers around his being. Communion with Him and fellowship with His Son are conditioned upon the soul's separation from sin. Sin is darkness. It is moral uncleanliness. It is unrighteousness of heart. It is lawlessness, spiritual anarchy. It is the work of the devil. To lead the soul to salvation from sin and to preserve the soul from sinning vindicates the purpose of God in

giving revelations to men.

It is truth experienced that is offered here as a restraint upon sin. To say that we have not sinned is to dispute the revelation of need which God gives. To say that we have no sin to be cleansed is to practice self-deception and prove ourselves void of the possession of truth. Jesus is the propitiation for our sins, and for the sins of the whole world. If we confess, the Father will forgive. "If we walk in the light as He is in the light," the efficacious blood will cleanse. Being pardoned and being cleansed, there is offered a divine enablement that lifts one above the practice of intentional wrongdoing. "These things write I unto you that ye sin not."—Way of Faith.
