EDITORIAL NOTES.

Brother J. F. Bullock informs us that he is taking up the question of fitting up Beulah rest room in the Hotel, and the organ and piano, and the grounds generally for the coming season with the chairman of the committee.

We are delighted to know that the rooms are being engaged so early for the meeting of the Alliance, and Beulah Camp Meeting. It may be possible that some would bring tents for this season. With a board floor and an oil stove they would be very comfortable.

We are glad to note that so many of our Churches are enjoying good spiritual interest, no matter whether they have pastors or not. We think some could have had pastoral care if they had asked the Lord. The Lord had a spare man or two, but?

While holiness people are supposed to stand squarely by the Scripture at all points, it seems strange to us to see how readily some of them pass by many important things taught in the Word of God, and accept of self appointed men, with their unscriptural notions, and misapplications, in self assumed superior (?) knowledge. Some good points come far short of making irresponsible men, who separate themselves from all other people so they can have all their own way, safe as religious teachers. It is an imposition for men who have no authentic credentials, further than recommendations from a few unknown men, to hang about churches who happen to be without pastors for a brief time.

The officers of these churches should demand of these men their credentials they claim to have and send them to some responsible person who will make enquiry about them.

A recommendation from some person who has heard them is not sufficient, but few of the properly qualified men are around in that way. If a man is all right, he will lose nothing by having his standing looked into.

This is a time when we need to pray

much for our summer campaign, and we need much meditation. As one man said that "he meditated the Bible through." We cannot do our work properly without prayer and meditation. King David said: "I thought on my ways, and turned my feet unto thy testimonies." If people would take time to think, there would be some things left undone that they now do, and there would be other things done which they now leave undone.

To succeed in the right way is to "commit our way unto the Lord; trust also in him, and he will bring it to pass." When we are appointed chairman of a committee that does not eliminate all the other members, nor make us the boss of the job. It simply means that when the committee is in session to consider its work, that we are to preside. No more; then the committee elects the different members to this or that part of the duties required. No member of a committee should proceed without the whole or major part consenting. Thus the best results will be reached, and dissatisfaction avoided. Harmonious work is pleasant work.

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We certainly should have more rooms, when people want to attend our meetings we should make an effort to accommodate them.

A considerable number of rooms can now be finished in the basement of the Hotel at a comparative small cost. Probably a dozen good rooms, and the time to do it is early in the season; the person to do it is some competent man of our own number if available; and one hundred dollars would buy four new tents 9 x 12. These would accommodate 4 small families. A hundred feet of boards would make a floor for a tent of that size. Of course extremely nervous people who are afraid of June-bugs and squirrels and things will require a room with a lock on the door, and a shutter on the window, but good campers can sleep when the early crow crawls for his breakfast and when the early boy rings the breakfast bell.
