And that he was seen of Cephas, then of the twelve: After that he was seen of about five hundred brethren at once; of whom the greater part remain unto this present, but some are fallen. asleep. After that he was seen of James; then of all the Apostles. And last of all he was seen of me also, as of one born out of due time.
