DO WE NEED A REVIVAL?

Does this Church, City, Province, Dominion of Canada need a revival? We do not need a revival of formality; not frozen together, everything is so dry, testimonies, prayers and sermons—and after special services are over and all the still born babes have been gathered into the membership, the report says: "There was no emotionalism." Not much like Samaria; for they had a big time. "And there was great joy in that city."

We suspect that in these still revivals, that no one finds out that they need a great change in their hearts, and lives. So they go right on in their old way.

CONVICTION AND REPENTANCE.

Some persons seem to avoid conviction. There cannot be saving repentance without it. "Not knowing that the goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance" (Rom. 2-4.)

It was reported that a minister who seemed moved by a sermon on holiness, a worker spoke to him, and he replied: "I never allow myself to get under conviction." It seems to us that any person who is right will welcome more light.

Salvation is at best a great and mysterious fact, a reality—man's greatest need.

Paul saw himself as the greatest sinner. This any man will conclude about himself, if he sees himself in the light of the same degree that Paul did.

Some mistake the revelation of their sinfulness, as a credit to themselves, and think a consciousness of sin and their acknowledgement of it a mark of their humility—The fact is that the revelation is from God and he wants them to get rid of sin.

Paul says his was an object lesson.

1st To reveal God's mercy: that in him (Paul) that Jesus Christ might show forth all long-suffering, for a pattern to them which should hereafter believe on him to everlasting life.

2nd While Paul was engaged in a work of the destruction of God's people.
3rd Suddenly, no previous notice given. 4th Tragical. 5th revealing unseen power by its results. 6th Transforming an

enemy into an ardent lover and servant, and gives a sample of his soul worship—I. Tim 1-17. "Now unto the King eternal, imortal, invisible, the only wise God, be honor and glory forever and ever." Amen.

* *POWER.*

Stephen had power. His murderers had power to kill the body, notwithstanding the Lord was looking on the scene. Both had power of an opposite kind, but there was no compromise in Stephen, had he compromised he would have missed the honor of martyrdom.

DEMONSTRATIONS.

There are demonstrations in some meetings by some persons, that demonstrate absolutely nothing of spiritual life or energy.

"And my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power.

That your faith should not stand in the wisdom of men, but in the power of God."

I. Cor. 2, 4-5. The Holy Spirit does the demonstrating, and it is remarkable how many people are misled by physical gyrations.

The Holy Spirit demonstrates to the world, by mighty reproof and convinces it of sin, and righteousness and judgement.
John 16-8.

The Holy Spirit demonstrates to the children of God as an abiding emforter, as the manifestation of truth, revealing to men the distinction between truth and error, and as the only leader into all truth, inspiring power to obey God, and to quit the old life, and walk the new life, so they are able to put off the old man with his deeds and to put on the new man, and becomes the leader of every trus child of God. "For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God." Every person possessing the Holy Spirit possesses the power He the Holy Spirit imparts, to pray for power which is of God, apart from the Divine person, designated as the Holy Ghost, is to beat the air. "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you."—Acts 1-18.
