Mrs. Martha Hagerman.

The death of Mrs. Martha Hagerman occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Edward Appleby, Millville, N. B., on Saturday, May 13th, aged 68 years. Sister Hagerman was born at Upper Hainesville, and was a daughter of the late Putman Jones. She professed religion when quite young and was baptized by Rev. Stephen Currie and united with the Free Christian Baptist Church at that place.

In 1872 she was married to Jacob A. Hagerman and later moved to Maple Ridge, where they resided for a number of years. In 1884 they moved to Millville, where two years later Mr. Hagerman died. About three years ago Mrs. Hagerman moved to Fredericton, where she and her son, Byron, lived until she was taken sick some months ago. She then came to live with her daughter, at whose home she passed away. Our sister was a great sufferer but bore it all with much patience. She was a charter member of the Reformed Baptist Church at Maple Ridge.
