NEEDED.

One of the great needs of these times is an awakening among sinners and backsliders—an old time conviction, when we shall hear the cry—"What shall I do to be saved?" Souls may be touched by the recital of a pathetic story, and make a start for the Kingdom of God, but do not get into the Kingdom, as their conviction is not strong enough. What is wanted is a true Bible conviction that will not only make them stop sinning, but cause them to cry to God for mercy through Jesus Christ, until they are heard and made "new creatures." Then, their lives will be rectified, confessions and restitutions will be made to the wronged ones, and the witness of the Spirit will be given, to their adoption into the family of God. How shall this conviction come? Through the prayers of God's people, the Holy Spirit will convict souls, as that is part of His office to "reprove the world of sin," etc. Hence, where there is no soul-burden for the unsaved among God's children, there is very little anxiety among sinners or backsliders, as to their condition. If, then we wish sinners to be anxious about the salvation of their souls, we must feel, and be as anxious about their salvation as we wish them to be. The question is often asked, why there are so few old-time revivals, and real conversions now-a-days. The true answer is, because there is so little soul travail, so little soul agony, among the ministry and church members for the birth of souls. It is so much easier, to get people to hold up their hands or sign a card, as a sign that they wish to become Christians; and then by some ordinance or form, bring them into the church as professors of religion, than to carry them on our hearts, unto there is a real travail, a real soul agony for them, and until they have a real soul agony to be saved, until they renounce every sin and accept Jesus Christ, and receive the witness of the Spirit to their salvation. Oh, for an old-time travail for souls among the children of God! Then we shall have old-time conviction, and old-time conversions. For the word of God is true which says "As soon as Zion tra-

vailed, she brought forth her children." May the Lord pour upon us the spirit of grace and of supplications. Zech. 12:10.

GRAND MEETING AT PEEL.

On Oct. 22nd, the Hartland Praying Band, operating with Brother Lee Good, held a very successful meeting at Peel; which I believe will long be remembered.
