RIVER JORDAN HARNESSED.

The River Jordan is to be harnessed to produce power for electric trains and lighting purposes. Jerusalem, Bethlehem and perhaps Nazareth will be lighted through the medium of a great hydro-electric plant to be erected on the banks of the river. A great network of railways, which is expected to spread all through Palestine, will get its motive power from the river.

The work is being backed by the Zionists and a contract has been awarded by the Palestine government for the work. The British Parliament has completed its investigation of the project and actual construction is being prepared for by a corps of workmen.—Wesleyan Methodist.
