Trafton was the preacher of Saturday morning, but on account of such a good prayer and testimony service, he only had twenty minutes to preach; but he brought something grand from Nehemiah 6:3, showing the great danger we are in as holiness people and showed the need of more prayer and definite preaching and testifying to sanctification.

Saturday evening meeting: preaching by Rev. E. W. Lester from 2 Timothy, 4:2. "Preach the word.", showing the need of preaching, a knowledge of the word, zeal in preaching, results of preaching. He held the attention of a full house. Some of the sermon notes will be given in a later Highway.

Sunday morning: Love Feast at 10.00, led by Willie Rideout. The time was all too short for every one to testify, but the time was well filled with good, warm, fervent testimonies and songs.

At 11.00: Preaching by Rev. I. F. Keirstead from 2 Cor. 7:1, on exhortation. We all need continually to be exhorted. He truly got down to where people lived. He said love is not bold, forward or assertive and finds no pleasure in injustice to others.

At 3.00 Rev. J. H. Coy preached from Hebrews 7:25. There is a possibility of being willing but not able to perform, and also being able but not willing. Gave several instances of people of low intelligence

getting saved as well as some very low in sin.

At 7.30 Rev. W. B. Wiggins was the preacher, taking Matt. 16:26. The soul and spirit are different from the body. God breathed into man the breath of life and he became a living soul. The soul is not physical, but spiritual; not of earth, but from God, and of infinite value. Because of the price of redemption and because of the battle for its possession. The soul may be lost because of error. So many isms to take the unwary and weak in the faith.

The meeting was grand, seven souls asking for prayers and the same got help. Near the close of this meeting a father arose and stated the fact that six of these persons were his three sons and their wives.

Saturday afternoon several ministers went home to their own stations, which tended to make some of the people discouraged, who said, "How will we get through the Sunday", and indeed to the few it did look discouraging but that was without reckoning the Lord in. Bros. I. F. Keirstead, J. H. Coy and W. B. Wiggins were the Sunday preachers who filled the bill, not lacking in anything. They were like the old war horse, as soon as the trumpet called and they smelled the smoke of battle, the old time strength and vigor came back and it was truly wonderful how they preached. The preachers were blessed as well as the people and some went home satisfied and some with a hungry look in their countenances.
